Test Suit Commenced

A test suit to determine the legal status of the Port of Bandon has been filed by County Attorney Liljeqvist and will be pushed to a decision in the supreme court of the

state. This action is taken to forestall possible trouble in the future, when private parties might bring a similar suit when it would interfere seriously with the work of the Port Commission.

Leaton Convicted

The jury in the case of W. J. Leaton, charged with robbing the safe of Eastside, of which town he was recorder, of \$3085, found a verdict of "guilty," after being out from 9:40 until shortly after 5 o'clock Thursday. Judge Morrow gave a sentence, which is provided by law, of one to fifteen years in the penitentiary, and also imposed a fine \$6170, twice the amount of the sum stolen. The verdict of the jury came as a surprise to many who listened to the evidence. The general comment had been that while there no doubt of Leaton's guilt, the fact that all the evidence was circumstantial would probably prevent the jury from reaching an agreement on a verdict. General satisfaction was expressed at the result, and the jury is given credit for using a lot of plain common sense in reaching their conclusion. County Attorney Liljeqvist is given great credit for handling a difficult case and for marshalling his evidence in a masterly manner. Judge Morrow gave the defense ten days in which to file further motions.
