A. F. Bergon, who went with his wife to southern California some time ago, is back for a short stay, expecting to go south again in a few days. He reports that he and Mrs. Bergon are having the time of their life, visiting relatives at San Diego, Los Angeles, Wilmington and other points and going from place to place in their auto. They expect to spend about three months more in the same way before returning home.

Fires in Marshfield

Marshfield was visited by two fires last week, each of which threatened great destruction in the business part of town. Two of the oldest buildings in the downtown district were the scenes of the embryo conflagrations.

On Monday the Montgomery building on Front street opposite the Blanco was gutted in the upper story by a blaze which started in a back room which had been used as a dumping ground by the occupants on the second floor. The flames had quite a start before they were discovered, but the fire department had salt water coming from the two engines in thirteen minutes after the alarm sounded, and the fire was under control in about half an hour. The losses by fire and water reached \$20,000 or more, the heaviest sufferer being the S. Lando dry goods store, whose damage was estimated at \$14,000. The Quartermass photograph gallery in the second story

was a total loss, and R. M. Sarter, Julius Larson and D. Y. Stafford were other losers. The building was formerly the Lando building, and in early days was owned by A. Lobbree, having been built in the early seventies.

On Tuesday a fire started in house-keeping rooms in the upper part of

the Gow Why building at the corner of Broadway and Market avenue, but comparatively small damage was done. Mr. and Mrs. Cuthbert Brown were quite severely but not dangerously burned. This building was formerly the Western hotel, and before that was the first store building erected in Marshfield.

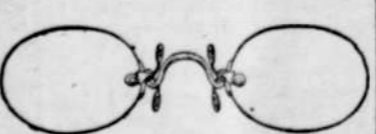
