**Three Young Men Lose Their Lives in River**

News reached here yesterday of a sad drowning accident which occurred Sunday afternoon near Gravel Ford, whereby three young men lost their lives. The victims were Wm. Robinson, aged 15, John Baumbaugh, aged about 20, and Morgan Shook, who would have been 17 in May.

The following particulars were given over the phone this morning by a brother of young Shook, who was an eye witness: The boys were all aboard a small launch and Robinson was standing at the bow. By some means, he lost his balance and fell overboard. John Baumbaugh, who was deckhand on the boat sprang overboard to his assistance, but was seized by the struggling boy in such a manner that both were helpless. Shook then jumped to go to their assistance, but sank and was not seen again by the witnesses. Besides the brother the father of young Shook was on the boat, and W. L. Krantz and Harry Krantz were on the boat, but none could render assistance in time, as it was all over in a few moments. The bodies were recovered that evening but not until life was extinct.

Mr. Shook recently bought the W. L. Krantz place near the scene of the accident, and the launch was loaded with some of his goods which were being taken to the place, and she was approaching the bank for landing when the accident occurred.

**"Shad" Hudson Dead**

A Roseburg dispatch dated Jan. 27 says: "Shadrach Hudson, for 65 years a resident of Oregon, a veteran of the Indian wars of 1855 and 1856, died yesterday at the Soldiers' Home in this city, aged 82 years. He crossed the plains to Oregon when 14 years old, and lived almost all his life in Douglas and Coos Counties. He has lived at the Soldiers' Home since 1904."

Judge Harris writes that he has received many communications urging him to be a candidate that he has decided to enter the race and will be a candidate before the primaries.

**Port Orford Wharf Gone**

The Port Orford Tribune gives the following account of the destruction of the wharf at that place, which occurred during the recent storm: The most serious loss was the entire destruction of the wharf during the high tide of Sunday night. The storm had stirred up a terrific sea, and that combined with the big new moon tide sent immense breakers over the top of the wharf with irresistible force, and the entire structure, which had served the people so faithfully for 28 years, was broken up and carried away, together with 2,000 railroad ties and 30 cords of match wood belonging to Mr. Loney, most of which, however, came ashore and were saved. The wharf was built in 1885, has stood the storms of 28 winters, and has been of inestimable value to all the people of Curry north of Rogue River. At the time of its destruction it was owned by the Wedderburn Trading Company, who had last summer given notice condemning it as unsafe. We are pleased to learn, however, that the company will build another wharf as soon as possible, and the loss will only be temporarily felt. In the meantime our merchants and others will be compelled to get their freight overland from Bandon.

**Mrs. Folsom's Death**

Further particulars of the death in Portland of Mrs. Florence Folsom, news of which came by wire, have been received by mail. She gave birth to a girl baby on Dec. 25th, and her death occurred at the Good Samaritan hospital on Jan. 15th. The funeral was held on Jan. 18th, and burial was in River View Cemetery, many friends and relatives being present. The baby is well and thriving.
