## THOSE CANAL TOLLS

One view of the question of the passage through the Panama canal of American vessels engaged in the coastwise trade free of tolls is voiced by J. H. Upton in a Curry county paper as follows:

Our American transportation combines knew exactly what they wanted and why, when they induced the committee on platform to insert that clause, but never so much as hinted at the true reason, which was, that they desired a monopoly of that trade against all the world, so there will be nothing to restrain them from charging shippers "all the traffic will bear." But it was ever thus. Special privilege has, by one device and another, been enabled to levy unjust tribute upon mankind.

As the same view is undoubtedly held by others who have not gone to the trouble of analyzing the situation, it might be well to do a little analyzing of our own. While it is usually safe to shut our eyes and strike out blindly whenever we approach a question on one side of which the corporations may be arrayed, yet there are cases where a little bit of real thinking is permissible. This is one of 'em.

When we happen to recollect that American ships already have a "monopoly" of the coastwise trade, for the reason that foreign ships are barred out and have been for a generation or so, we see that the "clause" has nothing whatever to do with the ability of the shipping trust to charge "all the traffic will bear." The exemption from tolls has nothing to do with their monopoly; they have that already. Having the monopoly, the imposition of tolls will be met by the simple process of adding the tolls to the freight rates, and the dear public will pay them. Not only the trust but the independent ship owners will be under the same necessity; there will be no advantage in the draw. And the only effect on the trust or its competitors will be that they must each charge enough extra freight to cover the tolls. It will be a tax on the producers and consumers of goods which must pass through the canal. It will handicap our Western producers in competing in the Eastern or European markets with foreign producers of the same kind of products. It will make the price of Eastern products higher on this coast. It will affect "monopoly" or "competition" not at all. If we want to tax ourselves thus, merely to please Johnny Bull it may be all right, but let us understand it that way.

## Basket Ball

Coquille lost her chance for the county basket ball championship last Friday night when they went down to defeat before the North Bend team on the home floor, the score being 18 to 14. It was the hardest fought, fastest and most exciting game seen in the county for years and the North Benders were compelled to work hard for every point made. Bowen, playing center for North Bend, who had made quite a reputation for himself before exceeded all previous achievements and scored the entire 18 points for his team. The home boys played an excellent game but in extremely hard luck as far as basket shooting was concerned. North Bend came over on an excursion train and was accompanied by a large number of rooters. The game was witnessed by the largest crowd in the history of the local high school, if not in the history of the county, the total gate receipts amounting to \$94.50, while many were turned away for lack of room.

Myrtle Point will play here next Saturday night and another good game is expected. Myrtle Point defeated Marshfield last Friday and have strengthened their team to a considerable extent since their last game with Coquille.

## Twenty Feet on the Bar

At a meeting in Bandon last Wednesday, the Port commission passed resolutions declaring a purpose to obtain 20 feet of water on the bar and extending to Parkersburg, a channel of 14 feet if possible, and not less than 12 feet to Coquille. Bonds to the amount of \$250,000 have been voted, to be issued in batches of \$50,000, as the money is needed, and with the \$90,000 which the general government is pretty sure to appropriate, the prospects for great and early improvement of the harbor looks excellent.

## Another Motor Installed

The Coquille Laundry & Ice Company have installed a 7½ horsepower electric motor for its ice plant, replacing the steam engine heretofore in use. A five horsepower motor was installed in the laundry department a couple of months ago, and its work was so satisfactory that Mr. Morrison recently went into executive session with Manager McKenna, of the Oregon Power Co., and allowed that gentleman to show him when it would pay to substitute electricity for steam in the ice department also. Coquille business men may be conservative and careful, but when they are shown they are in for progress—and they get there just the same.
