He would have known that work would stop on the railroad, for no apparent reason, causing a slump in business and spirits on Coos Bay, with a consequent failure of advertising patronage for the magazine. He would have known that, although the Southern Pacific had commenced work on the Drain road and spent a hundred thousand or so in actual construction, it was only a case of very temporary mental aberration; and he could have waxed rich by going out and making bets against big odds that the road would never be built. He would have known that when the S. P. officials solemaly assured us that the line would be completed in a year they were only lying. F. S. Dow Ends His Life By Drowning in the Bay

F. S. Dow, of Marshfield, one of the best known business men in Coos county, committed suicide last Friday by drowning himself in the bay. He left several notes to different parties, including his wife, one of them telling where to look for his body. His act had evidently been carefully planned, but he had given no intimation of his intentions even to his closest associates. He went home to lunch that day, as usual but a little earlier. Coming down town about 12:30, he went to his office at the Ocean dock, and when others arrived there a short time later they found a note telling them to look for his body off the dock at a certain point. The body was recovered about 5 o'clock, and it was found to be weighted with a piece of sewer pipe.

No adequate cause has been assigned for the act, although it is surmised that business reverses had preyed on Mr. Dow's mind. Dr. Mingus, his physician, states that about a year ago he was consulted by Mr. Dow for relief from mental trouble, and treated him at that time. Mr. Dow had done an extensive business in Marshfield and had extended his operations to the Coquille valley, handling much produce of the country and selling flour, feed, etc.

He had a family of a wife, daughter and two boys, to whom he was devoted, and the blow is a very heavy one on them. How his business affairs stand has not been determined, but he had life insurance to the amount of \$8000, so that his dependants will not be left destitute. His father and mother live at National City, near San Diego, and to that point his remains were shipped yesterday, funeral services being held at Marshfield before the departure.
