

**City Council**

At the regular meeting last night a full board was present, but not much business was transacted.

The bills against the city arising from the quarantine of the family of E. R. Campbell some time ago were acted upon. The bills of C. J. Fahrman and F. C. True, \$17.45 for medicines and \$102.25 for groceries, were ordered paid. The bill of Dr. Hoag, \$132 for medical services, took the council's breath away but the reasoning faculties of the members were not impaired so that you would notice it. A motion to pay the medical man half of what he wanted, \$66, went to a tie vote. Then a motion was put to pay him \$40, and this also went to a tie, which was decided by the mayor in the affirmative.

A paper in the form of an ordinance, but signed like a petition by 151 names, prohibiting the sale of liquor in Coquille was handed in to the recorder and was read to the council. J. E. Quick acted as sponsor for the paper and explained that it was submitted to the council to be acted on as that body thought best. It was explained that it was now too late to submit the measure as an initiative law at the coming election, and the sentiment of the council was that as the town had voted wet, and as the council was supposed to carry out the wishes of the majority, the time was not ripe for a dry ordinance, until the voters should indicate a change of sentiment.

A number of the Modern Woodmen were on hand, to find out what was what in regard to the incident last Saturday evening when Night Officer Plyler butted into their social affair at midnight. Dane Hudson acted as spokesman and made it quite plain that the office's intrusion had not made a bit with the Modern Woodmen. No official action was taken.

A resolution was adopted to the effect that the owners of property abutting on First Street must make connections with the sewer and abate all water closets, privies and cesspools within fifteen days or the work would be done by the city.

**Oregon Power Activities**

The Oregon Power Co. will put in a branch power line across the river at Johnson's mill for the accommodation of five progressive farmers on the south side of the river who want electric lights in their homes. Two of them, Messrs. Johnson and Detelsen, will also install electric motors for power, and it is likely that others in that vicinity will follow their example when they find out the advantages and conveniences of the motor on the farm or dairy ranch. To string the wires across the river two poles 65 feet high will be erected, and the span will be 200 feet.
