## War at Last

The town was startled yesterday by the report that the long-expected war with Mexico was at last fairly under way. The news came in the shape of a telephone message from the Record at Marshfield, to the effect that war had been declared, and this was practically verified on receipt of the papers this morning.

The late events which brought on this crisis started by the arrest by Huerta's officials of a number of bluejackets and their incarceration in prison. For this affront, the American commander on the ground demanded that Huerta salute the American flag. After quibbling over this for a week, Huerta on Saturday, was given until six o'clock Sunday evening to agree to fire such a salute. He failed to come through, and yesterday President Wilson laid the whole matter before Congress asking authority to use the army and navy against Huerta. This communication was handed in at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and a resolution was at once introduced placing \$50,000,000 at the disposal of the president. A resolution was also introduced "That the president be and hereby is justified to employ the armed forces of the United States to enforce the demands made upon Victoriano Huerta for unequivocal amendments to the government of the United States for affronts and indignities committed against this government by General Huerta and his representatives."

This means war, not on the Mexican people, but on Huerta and his followers. What it may lead to remains to be seen.

### The Latest

The Record was called up at 3:30 today and informed the Herald that the expectation that the resolutions mentioned above would pass Congress yesterday was not fulfilled, and they were still under consideration. The House adjourned at 3:15 until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, and there was no hope of the Senate taking action tonight. A report was current that marines had been landed at Vera Cruz. The German steamer "Musant," carrying a large amount of war supplies for Huerta had been stopped and told that she mustn't land them. An English oil steamer that had been chartered by Huerta to transport war material between Vera Cruz and Tampico had been forbidden by Admiral Craddock of the English fleet to carry out the commission, and part of the cargo that had been loaded was discharged, indicating British co-operation with the United States. The American war ships are due off Vera Cruz tomorrow. This was the gist of the day's dispatches to the Record, whose courtesy can be depended upon to give out the news as fast as it is received.

### Coos County Building and Exhibit at Fair

A joint meeting of the commercial bodies of Coos county was held here yesterday to consider the matter of having a special Coos County building at the Panama-Pacific Exposition. The meeting was attended by a large number of delegates and it was apparent that the project was to be carried out. The county court was interviewed and agreed to appropriate \$1000 for the purpose this year, which is the largest amount that the law allows. It is understood that an equal amount will be appropriated next year, making a \$2000 cash fund in sight for a starter. L. J. Simpson stated that the mills of the county had donated all the lumber that will be required for the building, including all interior finishing, paneling, doors and windows, etc.; also that the transportation companies had agreed to transport the material free of charge. It was stated that about \$15,000 in cash would be required for gathering the exhibit, placing it and taking care of it, furnishing attendance at the building during the fair and other incidentals besides the expense on the building. The county court having promised \$2,000, there is now \$13,000 to be secured, and a live campaign will at once be inaugurated to raise the fund. Another meeting was called for May 18th to form a permanent organization, and it is desired that this meeting be attended by delegates from every commercial organization in the county, as well as every other body or community that desires to be represented. The general plan will then be shaped up, committees appointed, and the whole project gotten under way.

### Youthful Offender

Frank Maupin, a boy of about ten years, is in the clutches of the law, and his case is expected to come up in the juvenile court today. He is charged with stealing a pocket book belonging to Mrs. Moon, of the Louvre restaurant, containing a small sum of money. The boy is in charge of H. W. Dushman, awaiting action of the court.

### City Council

The city council met last evening with a full attendance, except Councilman Leach.

C. R. Peck appeared before the council in the interest of Mrs. Alice McDonald, whose suit against the city for the flat-iron piece of ground at C. street was recently decided by the Circuit Court in favor of the city. Attorney Peck expressed the desire of his client to reach a compromise with the city, rather than to appeal to the Supreme Court. The matter was referred to the Finance committee and L. A. Liljeqvist, for investigation and report.

Oliver Wilson was allowed a rebate of \$8.50 on his theater license which was unexpired when he gave up the scenic.

Resolutions were passed for the improvements of certain streets and the city engineer was ordered to prepare plans and specifications. The streets affected are portions of Taylor, Elliott, Heath, Second, Beech, Collier, Coulter, Third, Henry and Hall streets, all in Elliott addition.

### Solitary Fly In April May Cause An Epidemic

SWAT the fly now!

The torpid, lazy moving insects are beginning to emerge from their winter quarters. They are to be the progenitors of trillions of epidemic makers. The menace which annually faces mankind through the activity of these distributors of germs and disease may be reduced, but only through the striking of a telling blow at the insects before they have had a chance to develop.

The wonderful reproductive capacity of this breeder of pestilence is the reason advanced why householders should begin an immediate fly swatting campaign. A solitary fly in April may seem a harmless thing, but if left undisturbed it may cause an entire community to be gripped by pestilence.

Health experts are beginning to realize that if flies are to be destroyed they must be attacked when they are least able to combat their natural enemies, and this is in the early spring, when food is scarce.

The close relation of cleanup campaigns to the fly exterminating propaganda has begun to be appreciated, and for this reason many municipalities already have commenced or are preparing for sanitary crusades. It has been demonstrated that the more filth that is removed from a city the greater difficulty is placed in the way of the development of the insect disease spreaders.

### City Caucus Thursday

The caucus for the nomination of candidates for city offices will be held Thursday evening. Mayor Morrison informs the Herald that the council chamber is too small for the crowd expected, and that the caucus may be held at the court house if the circuit court room is available. There seems to be but little excitement over city politics but it was intimated to the Herald this morning that a surprise might be sprung at the meeting. It is understood that Mayor Morrison would accept another term, and it is not likely that Recorder Lawrence would balk at serving again. Councilman Leach says he will not accept renomination, but Laird is in a receptive mood and Lyons could be persuaded. In the way of new timber, C. I. Kime seems to stand about 100 per cent.

### Bond Election Called.

With Circuit Court, the grand jury and the County Court in session, things have been moving at the court house since yesterday. The County Court decided today to issue the call for the proposed road bond election for the date of the primaries, and as we go to press the order is being prepared. The sentiment of the good roads forces seemed to be strongly in favor of this action, in spite of the talk that has been heard of again postponing the matter, it is thought best to bring the matter to an issue and let the voters decide. While the

present project is not perfectly satisfactory to a large number, it seems to be the best compromise that could be effected between the different ideas of the different sections of the county, and it is at least a start in the right direction.

### Educational Picture Coming

The management of the Scenic has secured for presentation here next week "The Top O' the World," a big educational feature in six reels. The picture shows Alaskan and Arctic scenes of the greatest novelty and interest, and is one of the real great pictures now being exhibited. It shows the grand and impressive scenery of the northern regions, the natives in their daily life, hunting fishing etc, the big game in the Arctic regions and all manner of unfamiliar scenes. The picture is being shown elsewhere at advanced prices and the parties who bring the picture to this county will not show it on the regular percentage basis at a ten cent admission; but as the management of the Scenic is determined to keep the price at ten cents, they will pay a flat price of \$20 for the privilege of exhibiting the picture for one day and take their chances on breaking even. In order to give the school children a chance to see the picture, a matinee will be run, commencing at 4:30, and this should be taken advantage of by those who are free at that hour, as the house is certain to be crowded in the evening and many are likely to be crowded out. The picture will be here Wednesday of next week.
