The Primaries

While official figures on the primary election are not yet available, the result in most cases is pretty well settled, though some of our local candidates as well as the bond issue were still in doubt as the Herald goes to press. The official tally commenced yesterday but had not been completed.

Dr. Withycomb takes the Republican nomination for the governorship and C. J. Smith has the Democratic place on the ballot.

W. C. Hawley is the Republican nominee for congress in this district and Fred Hollister has from 3000 to 5000 majority over Meredith for the Democratic nomination.

Geo. Brown is so far ahead that none of the others can see his dust. In the county "the Watsons" James and R. R. take the nominations for judge and clerk respectively, without a struggle.

Alfred Johnson, Jr. is the Republican nominee for sheriff and the indications seem to be that Gage leads for the Democrats by 100 or more.

For representative, Watkins is indicated for the Republican and Tom Hall for the Democratic places.

C. J. Armstrong and Elbert Dyer appear to be the opposing candidates for commissioner.

Candidate for Hero Medal Saves Man From the River

(According to late advices the story given below as it first came to us is wrong in several particulars, but it is such a good story as it stands that we hate to change it. Archie Tennison was also with the auto party; Parker did not dive in but went in with the blanket as a lifeline, and a rope was procured from a farmhouse with which to haul the two men out.)

Four men had an exciting time all to themselves Saturday night, while a rescuer and rescuee struggled in the waters of the river and two danced up and down on the bank. Jack Parker, of Marshfield, played the hero part, and this is no figure of speech, for medals have been awarded for acts less unselfishly heroic. The story comes to the Herald like this: Parker took passage with Earl Shroeder for Myrtle Point about 9:30. At the Collier place about a mile above town, they were hailed by a man who came running across the field and who implored them to come and help, as his partner had fallen into the river and neither could swim. They left the car and ran across the field to the bank of the river. The bank was high and steep and the night was dark, and the man in the water could not be seen. Parker was told, "He is down there somewhere." He threw off his coat and dived into the darkness. He made a good shot, passing under the man, who was clinging to a snag in the river. Parker seized the man and struck out, but had become confused as to directions and started the wrong way. The men on the bank lit matches to give him his bearings, and after a hard struggle and when on the point of exhaustion he brought his quarry to the shore. The strangers had been camping on the bank of the river, and their blankets were lowered as a life line to the two in the water so that Parker was able to struggle up the bank with his exhausted companion. The latter had been in the water a long time and was all in. He was bundled into the auto and brought back to town, where Parker procured dry clothing and resumed his journey to Myrtle Point. He acknowledged that while in the water he had reached the point where all the mean things he had ever done began to pass before him in review, and he did not care to go through another such experience.

League Social

About twenty-five were present and a most enjoyable evening was spent with games and music. Miss Twidwell, the district deaconess, added much to the jollity of the occasion by the introduction of some novel games. Unsettled Question

The meeting called for yesterday of representatives of the commercial bodies of the county, for the purpose of discussing plans for a Coos county building at the Panama-Pacific exposition brought together a number of the boosters of the county. Among those from other towns were Messrs. L. J. Simpson and Peter Loggie, North Bend; Hugh McLain and — Smith, of Marshfield; Treadgold, Feeney and Geisendorfer, of Bandon; Mayor Roberts and Dr. Johnson, of Myrtle Point. The meeting found itself face to face with a conflict of evidence and opinion as to whether such a building would be allowed by the exposition management, and all action was postponed until this point could be officially settled.

Two cars will be placed on the route, leaving each end at 7:15 a. m. and making two round trips a day.
