**COQUILLE DRY AFTER FIRST OF NEXT MONTH**

**Council Listens to Petitioners and Refuses Licenses**

Pierce, no; Skeels, no; Sanford, no; Lyons, no; Kime, no; Leach, yes—that is the way the vote stood last night on the granting of liquor licenses for the six months commencing July 1st. This means that Coquille will be dry three weeks from today.

The council chamber was jammed, the adjoining recorder's office occupied, and the hallway filled last evening by citizens who were interested in the action of the council on the four applications for liquor licenses, against the granting of which a petition containing 445 names had been filed. This was largely a majority of the legal voters, and it was realized that the council was up against it for fair.

On calling the meeting to order, Mayor Morrison at once brought up the matter of the petition and asked if any one had anything to say. The first thing said was by a lady in the corner, who arose and requested that her name be taken off the petition. Then there was a long pause and the silence was unbroken until some one called for "Hawkins."

Mr. Hawkins responded by saying that he did not see that it was necessary to make a talk, as the matter had been well presented by Mr. Anderson at the last meeting of the council, and he had nothing further to add.

A. J. Sherwood then made a short talk. He said that he represented only himself and presented only his individual views. He said that there was no provision in the charter for "legislation by petition." He did not think it the proper way to deal with the question. He thought that the movement to put the saloon men out of business at this time by the refusal to grant licenses was ill advised, as the whole matter was to be voted on in November. He also called attention to the fact that the elimination of \$2000 from the year's revenues would work confusion in the city's finances.

H. O. Anderson replied to Mr. Sherwood's remark about "legislation by petition" by saying that the right of petition was one of the first granted by the Constitution of the United States, and he thought that the petitioners were clearly within their rights. Regarding the financial end of it, he said that the situation would have to be met sooner or later and he thought that it would be as easy at this time as six months from now. The affairs of the city would adjust themselves to the loss of the saloon revenue.

Walter Sinclair talked briefly against the petition, bringing out the point that there were undoubtedly many names on the petition of people who had really signed against their personal preference, and who if the matter were put to a secret ballot would vote the other way. He aroused considerable of a buzz by solemnly asserting that he had no personal interest, as he never took a drink.

A. J. Sherwood and M. O. Hawkins each had a few more words to say explanatory of their position, and the Mayor then theoretically called Councilman Pierce to the chair and explained his position in the matter. Mayor Morrison said that he had been both misunderstood and maligned on this question of wet or dry. His position had been at all times in favor of carrying out the will of the people of the city; if they wanted it wet it should be wet, while if they wanted it dry, then dry it was. He did not know at this time whether the decision would depend on his vote; but he wanted it understood that if he had to decide a tie, in the face of that petition of a large majority of the voters, he would resign his office before he would vote for license. This aroused great applause led by one of the saloon men who

had evidently misunderstood what the mayor said.

The pending applications of the four saloons for licenses were then taken up, and that of E. A. Beckett was first put to a vote. The roll-call resulted as first above stated, five to one against the granting of the application.

The crowd then melted away and left the council staring the situation in the face. No time was lost in taking the preliminary steps for re-adjusting the revenues of the city. L. A. Liljeqvist was instructed to prepare an amendment to the charter, raising the limit of assessment for city purposes from ten to twenty mills, and this will be submitted to a vote of the people at the earliest possible date, about sixty days.

Another matter to be submitted at the same time will be the issue of \$30,000 of bonds for the water system. There are now outstanding \$12,500 of the amount originally issued, the balance of about an equal amount having been paid out of the revenues of the system. The outstanding bonds will be refunded with new ones, and the expenses now being incurred for the improvement of the system will bring the amount to be issued up to about \$28,000.

Bids for the city printing for the ensuing year were opened. The Herald and the Sentinel each made a bid of four cents a line. Probably remembering when they went to Sunday School, and that "to him that hath shall be given," the dads gave the contract to the Sentinel.

Adjournment was taken till tomorrow evening.

**Collins Bound Over**

Louis Collins was brought over from the Bay Saturday by Constable Cox and appeared before Justice J. J. Stanley to answer a charge of pointing a gun at G. W. Stewart, of North Bend. He waived examination and was placed under \$250 bonds to appear before the next grand jury. A case of trouble between the two men was to have come before Justice Shuster at North Bend a short time ago, and District Attorney Liljeqvist went over to prosecute it. He was informed by Justice Shuster that Stewart had dropped the charge, so he took his foot in his hand and came home again. Later, Stewart denied that he had withdrawn the charge, and it was tried out before Shuster, with attorneys employed by Stewart and Collins. The result of that round was that Collins was turned loose and Stewart was bound over. This did not exactly suit George Washington, who seems a bit hard to please, and he brought the charge that Louis had threatened to shoot him.
