City Council

The council held a protracted meeting last night, all the councilmen being present and Chairman Pierce acting as presiding officer.

The bids for paving portions of Elliott, Third and Henry streets were considered, and considerable time was consumed in figuring on the offers of the Warren Construction Co. and the Longston Construction Co.

The Contract was let to the Warren Construction Co. for the base and covering only, the base being of concrete four inches thick with a standard sheet asphalt covering 1 1/2 inches thick. The Longston Construction Co. was awarded the grading, drains, curbs, sidewalks, bridges etc.

The council acted favorably on the petition of L. H. Hazard and others, which was mentioned last week, asking for the vacation of 10 feet on each side of Heath street, adjoining blocks 39 to 52, inclusive, and an ordinance was passed making such vacation and vesting the title to the vacated land in the owners of the adjoining property.

In the matter of judges and clerks of election, Geo. T. Moulton was appointed to take the place of N. C. Kelly on the night board, Mr. Kelly now being a councilman by appointment. Adjournment was taken until next Monday evening.
