Public Ownership Saves In State Printing Office

As an ounce of results is worth a pound of theory, the Herald is glad to give publicity to the short report just received from the state printer, showing the saving to the taxpayer already effected through public ownership of the state printing office.

State Printing Department Salem, July 21, 1914

To the Taxpayers of Oregon:
 The sum of \$7,657.99 for the quarter ending June 30 last, or \$2,552.00 for each month of the quarter, is the gain due to the present State ownership system in the State Printing Department.

Every item of printing has been carefully computed at the rate fixed by the old law and the difference of cost under the present law, in your favor, is as shown above.

These figures are higher than any estimate or prediction of mine, and are a surprise to me.

Detailed records of cost, showing minutely every item of overhead and general expense, are at your disposal in the State Printing Department.

The complete record of gains to date by virtue of State ownership, is as follows:
 September 8 to December 31, 1913..... \$3,257.34
 January 1 to March 31, 1914..... 5,417.23
 April 1 to June 30, 1914..... 7,657.99

Total..... \$16,332.56
 The total amount saved to date (at the end of 10 months) is nearly \$1000.00 in excess of the initial cost of the printing plant, although liberal depreciation and interest have been regularly charged to the cost of the public printing.

Leroy Casey Shoots Himself Through Heart

Leroy Casey, a young man of 23, committed suicide Friday evening near Lee by shooting himself through the heart with a 25 20 carbine. The cause of his act was the fear that a young lady with whom he had been keeping company had transferred her affections to some one else.

The young man came here about two years ago from Walla Walla, where his father resides, and had been working for Mr. King on the Winsor & Falkenstein ranch a mile above the Fox bridge on the north fork. Revival meetings had been in progress near by, and it is said that the young lady had attended in company with another man. On Friday evening Casey had a conversation with her and asked her if she had gone back on him. She treated the matter lightly and avoided a direct answer. Then he told her that if she deserted him he would kill himself. She did not think him in earnest. This was about 7:30. About 9 o'clock, after Mr. and Mrs. King had retired and Mr. King had gone to sleep, Mrs. King heard Casey come into the large tent in which they were all sleeping, go the corner in which two guns were kept, and go out again. She arose and went to the corner, finding that the carbine was missing. She awakened her husband, but he thought little of the matter. Then she heard the report of a gun a short distance away. When the people returned from the meeting a search was made and the body was found lying across the gun. The young man had evidently held the short barreled carbine held in front of him and pulled the trigger with his finger, the bullet passing through the heart and ranging downward.

A message was sent to the father and he gave instructions to have the body buried here, stating that he could not come.

Returns From Vacation

Edgar McDaniels and family returned from San Diego Saturday after having spent five weeks away from the city. They went down the coast through Bandon, Gold Beach, Crescent City, Eureka, then across the mountains to Red Bluff, then south to Sacramento, Stockton, San Jose, Santa Barbara, Ventura, Los Angeles and San Diego. Returning they came over the Shasta route. In all 18 days and nights were spent on the road, and they camped out every night, and ate their meals over their own camp fire. They traveled all told 3,400 miles, made 20 miles to a gallon of gas, and experienced but one accident.—North Bend Harbor.

The wagon ran over him and he was severely bruised about the head, shoulders and wrist, but no bones were broken. A new source of supply will be found on higher ground and a reservoir will be put in and the water piped to the buildings under a pressure that will add to the usefulness of the system and will furnish more adequate fire protection.

City Council

The city council held a called meeting Friday evening for the purpose of considering and reconsidering the awarding of contracts for the improvement of a portion of Third, Elliott and Henry streets. By a unanimous vote it was determined to reconsider the action taken at a previous meeting in awarding

the contracts to the Longston Construction Co., and the Warren Construction Co., and the whole matter was then laid on the table to be taken up Monday.

At last night's meeting, by a unanimous vote, the bids were rejected and the checks deposited by the bidders were ordered returned. The reason for this action is given as the fact that Attorney Liljeqvist, acting for the city, did not consider the contracts and specifications satisfactory.

The Longston Construction Co. was paid \$312.60 from the general fund and \$1216.53 from the special fund.

The printing of the pamphlets for the election of August 24th was awarded to the Herald, while the Sentinel was given the printing of the ballots.

It was moved and carried that the proper authorities take steps to compel Martin Ellingson to make connections for his property with the First and C street sewer.

A motion that the city engineer prepare plans and specifications for the improvement of portions of Third, Elliott and Heath streets failed to carry.
