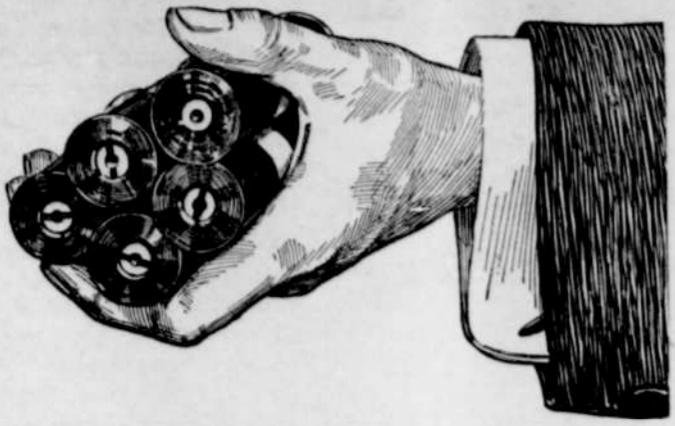

When the matter of the establishment of the Port of Bandon was before the people the Coquille papers did all they could for the measure, considering it a good thing for the whole river. One of the arguments used here against the scheme was that Bandon would "hog" all the benefits and Coquille would be putting up its money for the privilege of holding the sack. The Herald deprecated any such spirit of petty jealousy and did not care if Bandon would reap the greater benefits, which she naturally would; Coquille would come in for its share. We were willing to believe that the well known "Bandon spirit" would not go to the extent of even trying to corner all the good things that come down the water pike; that she would be willing to leave a few crumbs for Coquille. Later developments, however tend to indicate that the Herald was mistaken in its estimate of the Bandon nerve, and that if Coquille gets anything out of the port commission it will be against the strenuous opposition of our sister by the sea. This awakening has come by the process which is usually efficacious in bringing a man out of his slumber—a good solid heel coming down on the toes. In the suit now pending in the supreme court, the printing of voluminous transcripts of testimony and of briefs is involved. A District Attorney Liljeqvist is conducting one side of the case, it would naturally be most convenient for him to have his brief printed here where he can read the proof and oversee the work, and as Coquille is in the district there seems no good reason why Coquille printers should not have the work. This, however does not seem in accord with the "Bandon spirit," and as the suit is a "friendly" one the Bandon influence appears to be strong enough to pull all port business in which there is any money into the maw of the city by the sea. Mr. Liljeqvist's transcript of testimony has been printed at Bandon by the Western World, in which the general impression is that G. T. Treadgold is a stockholder. Now the plan is to force the printing of Mr. Liljeqvist's brief also into the favored office, much to the inconvenience of the prosecuting attorney and against his protest. The Herald considers this what may be poetically called a rank piece of business. On all considerations of fairness and business convenience the brief should be printed in Coquille. The Herald is not obsessed with the desire to do the printing itself—it could with some qualms of envy, see the job go to our hated rival up the street—but the job should be done here. If the Treadgold influence proves strong enough to pull this first little port "benefit" all to Bandon, it will leave an exceedingly bad taste in the mouth of at least one Coquille newspaper.

### Missionary Association of the Churches of Christ

The Coos County Christian Missionary Association of the Churches of Christ was held at Myrtle Point, Aug. 18, 19 and 20. The convention was attended by 65 delegates from the various churches of the county. The reports of the churches show that the growth of the church has been larger this year than any previous year. C. F. Swanker, state corr. secy. of the churches of Oregon, and J. C. Ghormley, from India, added much to the interest of the convention. Mr. Ghormley gave his stereopticon lecture on the missionary work in the far East. Each department of the church had a place on the program and splendid help was given by workers of these departments. The reports of the various churches are as follows: North Bend, Mrs. Samuel Gregg, pastor, church organized Nov. 3, 1913, present membership 15, building dedicated costing \$1250, Bible school has 52 members. Marshfield church, Samuel Gregg, pastor, members, 104, additions during the year 59, Bible school 106 enrolled, average attendance, 83 per cent, C. W. B. M., 47 members. Coquille, T. B. McDonald, pastor, 135 members, 65 additions during the year, average attendance in the Bible school 90, Christian Endeavor, 30, C. W. B. M. 47 members. Myrtle Point, E. E. Coulter, pastor, 82 members, 48 additions during the year, 130 members enrolled in the Bible school, Christian Endeavor 20 members, C. W. B. M. 11 members. Circle Girls, 12 members. Bridge, E. E. Coulter, pastor, 36 members, 3 additions, Bible school 140 enrolled, Circle Girls, 9 members.

The following officers were elected for the coming year: president, C. A. Schibred, Marshfield, vice president, Cal. Ray, Myrtle Point, secy., Mrs. Edith Connor, North Bend, treas., Mrs. Anna Colvin, Coquille, supt. of circles Miss Lou Hooton, Bridge.

### NOTES ON THE PHOTOPLAYS

"A Million Bids," shown at the Scenic Friday night was all that the advance notices gave us reason to expect, and those who took the Herald's advice saw a powerful and absorbing drama in which the intense interest was sustained to the very last. The scenery was fine and the collision scene was one of the most realistic ever shown on the screen. Anita Stewart was good all the way through and toward the last was positively great. Her acting before the closed door held the audience breathless, and the unappreciative who usually giggle at a strong scene were mercifully quiet. He is too good to lose.

It is with regret that one chronicles the fact that Mary Fuller seems to have lost her grip altogether. Her "Dolly of the Dailies" series, the second of which was shown at the Scenic Sunday night is not a thing to take the world by storm. The much heralded fact that she has "left Edison" probably means, if the truth were known, that she simply lost her job. Now she will be featured by some minor company on the strength of the reputation she made when she was doing real acting.

"Goodness Gracious," the three-reel Vitaphone comedy feature which is being advertised by the Scenic for Saturday night is another picture that the Herald wishes to recommend in the highest terms to anyone who has faith in the judgment of the marine reporter who gets up these notes. Those who enjoy Sidney Drew's high-class comedy will find it a genuine treat. Both picture houses are making a strong effort to show the best features at popular prices, and the Coquille public can have no complaints to make on that score. They should appreciate the fact that these special pictures are being shown here for less money than in any other town in the county.

### A Bum Job

The pamphlets containing the measures to be voted on at the general election this fall have been received from the Secretary. Not going into the subject matter of the pamphlet, the Herald would like to remark that it is about the bummiest job of printing and binding that ever came under our observation. It would be a disgrace to any country job office in the state. If the record of economy that is being made by the office under state ownership is achieved by turning out that kind of work, State Printer Harris would better consider the point made, and go to doing some real printing.
