SMITH — At Riverton, Oregon, Oct. 1, 1914, Benjamin F. Smith, aged 57 years.

The deceased was a native of Green Co., Arkansas, and had lived in the Coquille valley about 25 years, being engaged in farming. His health had been failing for about four years, but he was confined to his bed only two weeks before he died. Besides the widow, he leaves four sons and two daughters: Walter, Mrs. Alma Kay, Edwin, Bonnie, Warren and Lyle. The funeral was held Friday from the undertaking parlors, burial being in the Masonic cemetery.

Joint Debate

The joint debate held at the court house last Friday evening between Col. E. Hofer, representing the wets, and Rev. W. H. Selleck, of Portland, representing the dries, brought out a good attendance. The debate was carried on with great good feeling by the speakers and furnished a lively entertainment. Whether any voter's opinion was changed by hearing the argument is another matter. Those who have expressed an opinion to the Herald thought that Mr. Selleck had a shade the best of it.

Bond Bid Rejected

A short session of the city council was held last evening and the monthly accumulation of bills was disposed of.

Mark Savage, representing the A. G. Long company was at the meeting and took the city's order for 400 feet of hose and one shut-off nozzle.

A petition from John C. Magell and W. A. Custer, asking for a side walk on Watkins street and adjoining the White tract was referred to the Street committee for a report.

The only bid received for the \$30,000 6 per cent, funding bonds of the city was one from Sweet, Causey, Foster & Co., of Denver. They offered to pay \$30,025 for the issue, but asked \$2250, "for acting as your fiscal agent and to cover our attorney's fees." A letter accompanying the bid explained that the nature of the bid was due to the financial uncertainty caused by the European war, and the fact that very few bonds are being sold in market. The council considered the take-off too heavy, and the bid was rejected.
