Considerable consternation and discussion was aroused by the word passed around last week that it had been discovered that a constitutional amendment passed in 1910 lengthened the terms of all judges elected that year to six years. This would leave County Judge John F. Hall two more years in office, and leave James Watson and J. J. Stanley, who have been fighting to succeed him, paving an empty void.

In Watson's case, especially, it would seem to be a disconcerting joke, for he relinquished the nomination for county clerk, which he might have had without question, for that for judge. It would seem to be an excellent plan for the voters to express their preference, just the same, and then if Judge Hall should resign, which may reasonably be expected, the candidate polling the larger vote today could be appointed to succeed him—if that wouldn't be too reasonable and common sense a way of conducting politics. In the mean time, we may wonder why some of the state's wise lawyers didn't discover all this before.

School Notes

The High School gave a Halloween party at the school house last evening. The usual ghostly games and spooky stories made up the evening's entertainment.

An election was held in the High School last Friday, the students voting on the state officers and some of the measures to be voted on at the general election. If the outcome of the election in the school is any forecast of the final result in the town, Coquille will give good majorities to Hollister, Chamberlain and Dr. Smith, and will go dry almost unanimously.

The special school meeting to provide for the expenses of the school for the current year, will be held at the school house next Friday. The advanced typewriting students have been taking moderate speed tests for the certificate awarded by the Underwood Typewriter Company.
