Big Deal in Real Estate

The most important real estate deal that has been consummated here for some time has just been closed. Chas. Walker has bought the stock in the Coquille Land Company which owns the tract of land east of the city. Mr. Beale and L. D. Smith, of Marshfield, each owned half of the stock in the company, which is capitalized at \$25,000, and Mr. Smith still retains his stock. Mr. Beale having moved to California and having heavy interests there has disposed of his investments here for the sake of concentrating his resources. Mr. Walker, the new owner, has been here for several years handling real estate, and having great faith in the future of this section, was glad to grasp the opportunity for investment in this splendid piece of property. The tract originally consisted of 320 acres and was owned by John Notley, who took it up under homestead and timber rights. Notley's addition is a part of the tract, and there are 260 acres besides. It is on this land that the Aasen Bros. are logging, and the removal of the timber is now showing the fine location. The view from the tract is magnificent, taking in the town and a large area of this beautiful valley. The reservoir and dam of the city water works is located on the land.
