The Herald received last week a handsome lithographed folder sent out by the Flanagan & Bennett Bank, of Marshfield, on the occasion of the 25th anniversary of its opening, which occurred on the 11th of November. This was the first bank established in Coos County, and it has been closely identified with the business development of Coos Bay, which it has in many ways helped to promote. It has been conducted on conservative lines, and its influence has always been for conservative methods, taking no chances. It has been a steady influence in a community in which the tendency toward "booming" has at all times been strong. At the same time, the individual or firm that needed and was entitled to accommodation has found the Flanagan & Bennett bank a rock of refuge, and more than one Coos Bay business man has been kept out of the breakers by "Joe Bennett." As one of the earliest and for many years a small depositor, the writer knows whereof he speaks, and he has only the good word to say for the Flanagan & Bennett Bank.

Hard Times in Washington

H. D. McIntyre returned Friday, after an absence of about two months. He was visiting in the Yakima valley in Washington, where he has property interests. He says that times there are extremely dead. No building is going on and there is no sale for farm products. Cash collections are practically impossible, as he found in trying to collect money from parties who have plenty of property but can raise no money. As an illustration of conditions he states that he saw 20 acres of good land that had been sold a few years ago on time for \$1500 go back to the original owner for an unpaid balance of \$350. Mr. McIntyre says we are in paradise compared with conditions elsewhere.

What Reduction Did

Readjustment of the tax roll has been completed by the county assessor, T. J. Turiff, following the equalization by the county board and it was found that the reductions amounted to \$67,605.00. The former appraisal was \$22,057,740, and the new assessment is \$21,380,135.—The Record

Mrs. Coats of the Bay being unanimously elected Chairman with Mrs. R. S. Knowlton of Coquille, as Vice Chairman. After all business matters had been disposed of, it was announced that according to schedule the next meeting would be held at North Bend, but that if for some unforeseen reason that city found it impossible to entertain, either Marshfield or Coquille would be glad to do the honors. The convention adjourned at about 10:30.

NOTES ON THE PHOTOPLAYS

Of Interest to Those Who Patronize the Mvoies

Mrs. J. Bledsoe has been experiencing some of the inconveniences attending the motion picture business, when service is received from a certain class of picture "magnate." Last Wednesday the Grand was well filled with people who had come to see an installment of the "Trey of Hearts" series. The first reel went all right, but when the second reel was started it was instantly seen that it was the second reel of another picture altogether, one that had been run here several days before. The wrong reel had been sent from Marshfield, although the strip around it indicated that it was the second reel of the Trey of Hearts, so that the operator here did not discover the mix-up until he began to run the film. The mistake could not be rectified that night, but Mrs. Bledsoe had an announcement made that the picture would be run right the next evening. The second reel of the Trey of Hearts came over the next day, but G. J. Lemanski's representative demanded that the first reel be sent to Bandon, to go from there to Marshfield, cutting out Coquille altogether.

This Mrs. Bledsoe positively refused to do, stating that she proposed to show to her patrons the picture that they wished to see; that the trouble was the fault of the Marshfield bunch, and they could take the consequences. She was then threatened with having her service cut off altogether, but she stood her ground and kept the pic-

ture, showing it Thursday night. It should be stated that Mr. Selmar, the Bandon show man endorsed Mrs. Bledsoe's action fully, although it resulted in disappointment and inconvenience to him. The Lemanski crowd carried out their threat sending no pictures Friday, thus fooling the Coquille public in their expectations of seeing the regular installment of the "Million Dollar Mystery," which should have been shown that night. This kind act will probably be remembered by the Coquille public. But there was a picture show at the Grand Friday night, just the same. On Saturday night the local dramatic company, under direction of Edson Elliott repeated the play of "Chums" to a full house. In the mean time, an amicable understanding with the management of the Scenic was arrived at.

The Scenic gave its last performance last Saturday and is now closed. Mrs. Bledsoe took over the licensed service, and the licensed pictures are now being shown at the Grand. Special features of the independent service will also be shown, and Mrs. B. expects to get the cream of both services. A telegram from the Film Supply Co., of Portland, assures her that Mr. Lemanski has no control over the independent service in this county and that she can deal direct with them. So the theater-goers can rest assured that they will be given the best that is going in the county, and that the Grand, with further improvements now in contemplation, will be one of the best show houses in the county.
