## Myrtle Point Business Man Dies Suddenly

Rufus W. Lundy died suddenly at his home in this city about 9:00 o'clock last Thursday evening of heart failure. Mr. Lundy had just returned from a trip down town and seated himself in a rocking chair and was not in the house over five minutes when he died.

Mr. Lundy was about seventy years of age. He came to Myrtle Point in 1890 and has ever since been engaged in the hardware business with his partner, D. A. Huling, these families having come here from Kansas. He has been a leader in many a community development project and last fall was elected president of the Bank of Myrtle Point.

His wife died about a year ago and they are survived by three children, William E. Lundy and Mrs. Eva A. Lane of this city and Mrs. Mabel A. Dreisbach of San Francisco, who is on the road now to attend the funeral.

Mr. Lundy was a veteran of the Civil War, having served in the 123rd Ohio Infantry, and was a member of Col. Jewel Post, G. A. R., at the time of his death. He was also a member of the Masonic Lodge and the members of the local lodge A. F. & A. M. assisted by the Shriners will have charge of the funeral, the time for which has been set for 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon of Saturday, November 21st.—Enterprise.
