The dairies of this section are closing for the winter, after a fairly good season's run. The Zumwalt factory at Sixes made its last batch of cheese Monday.

Willis Moore was in town last night returning to his home at Gold Beach from having taken 30 head of hogs to Marshfield on the last trip of the Rustler. The hogs were sold at the Bay for 7c per pound.

Bad Messes

jail here on bonds, after which the marriage took place. Later, the younger sister, Lolita, was released and placed in the custody of her father, M. A. Simpson.
