The Steamer Grace Dollar called into Port Orford harbor last Thursday and loaded some 3000 ties and 80,000 feet of clear cedar lumber.
Nat Boatwright is down from Bandon inspecting railroad ties. There are now about 15,000 ties in the neighboring woods, and the number of men hewing them is being steadily increased. It is estimated that about 100,000 ties will be shipped from Port Orford this summer.

child born at the White House, and the young Miss Cleveland has been popular ever since—and is today. The record of party accomplishments have been improved under the Wilson regime, and although it was the President's daughter, Mrs. Sayre, who gave birth to a husky boy in the Executive Mansion, yet that does not detract from the joy of Democracy or the country, which always indulges in a good deal of ecstasy over such events.
EXTRA SESSION UNLIKELY
There is but one thing standing in the way of Congress 'knocking off' from March to December, and that is the shipping bill demanded by the Administration. The regular appropriation bills will, of course, be passed, and while there are attempts to becloud the issue by injecting rural credits and other measures, yet it is unlikely that any questions will be considered to the exclusion of the President's favorite measure. And, since Congress is more anxious than the Executive to get through, it is unlikely that the morning of March 4th will arrive without a clean slate in the two Chambers of Congress.

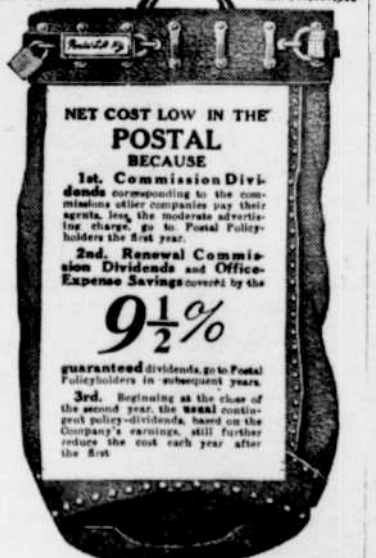
