**The Telephone Deal**

Last Tuesday, too late for the Herald, the news was given out of the consummation of a deal that had been in progress for some time by which the Farmers Telephone Company bought the lines of the Coos and Curry Telephone Co. centering at Myrtle Point, and a switching arrangement was entered into for Coquille. Heretofore the two systems have been entirely independent of each other, and the subscribers on each system were incomunicado, so far as those on the other were concerned.

Now the two exchanges at Myrtle Point will be consolidated by the Farmers line. The Coquille exchanges of the two systems will be connected by wire, and those on either line can be connected with those on the other for a switching charge of 10 cents. Parties on either line here can be connected with the Myrtle Point exchange without a switching charge.

This will be a great improvement in the service for all concerned, as communicating from one line to the other, even with a small charge will be better than no communication at all. And both lines will have access to the long distance lines.

**Doing Road Work**

Fred Baker, supervisor of road district No. 12, was in town last week. He says that he has been working on what has been called the "gold brick" road. This is a road about five miles long running up the east fork from the Coos Bay wagon road at the Howe place. It is for the accommodation of seven settlers who have taken up land and moved their families onto it, and who needed the road for an outlet. About three miles of the road has now been graded. Mr. Baker is going to work on the old road in Brewster valley, where the road has been relocated to put it above high water and give a better grade. A distance of about 150 rods is to be graded and planked with lumber from Ed Abernethy's sawmill. He says that the road into Brewster valley will be ready for autos with a few days of sunshine.
