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Library Benefit Will

Be at the Scenic

Arrangements have been made by the library board whereby the entertainment for the benefit of the library, which has been advertised to be given Friday at the Masonic hall, will be given in the Scenic theater instead.

The Scenic had a Fox Feature picture, "The Kreutzer Sonata," scheduled for that evening, but rather than have the two attractions pulling against each other from opposite sides of the street, arrangements were made whereby the picture was postponed until Saturday evening and the house was sold to the library for Friday evening at a price that will allow a nice margin for the library if the people turn out as they should.

Early in the summer the library board of Coquille arranged with Mrs. Franklin E. Conway for a concert as a library benefit which will take place next Friday, September the seventeenth at Coquille. The program will consist of songs both educational and of an entertaining nature with a few German, Italian and Norwegian selections, while lighter numbers and arias will also be rendered by Mrs. Conway who possesses a voice of much sweetness and fine cultivation and who since coming to Marshfield has won one of the most prominent places in the musical colony of the Bay. Mrs. Conway has a graceful personality and delightful stage presence and will certainly please the valley music lovers. Mrs. Powell, while not so well known here is credited with being a most finished pianist, hence with Mrs. Bugge, Mrs. Powell and Mrs. Conway, Coquille will certainly be provided a really rare treat. The readings by Mrs. Bugge will contain many interesting selections both of a humorous and serious nature and the entertainment promises to be of much interest to lovers of good music and the best in declamatory art.
