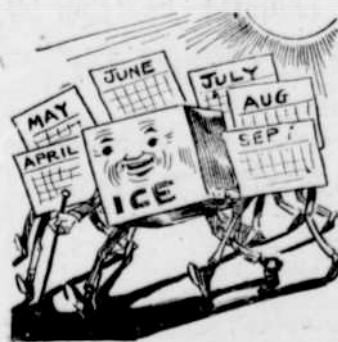

## School Notes

The Coquille High School Liter-  
ary Society met last Friday in the  
assembly room and a program of  
four numbers was given. The first  
number was a debate on the ques-  
tion which will be fought out in the  
state debates, Resolved: That the es-  
sential features of the Swiss Mil-  
itary System should be adopted in  
the United States. The members  
of the affirmative team were Leslie  
Schroeder and James Hersey, while  
Myrtle Cunningham and Merton  
Tyrrrel upheld the negative. The  
decision was two to one in favor of  
the affirmative. The debate was  
followed by a piano solo by Marvel  
Skeels and readings by Bonny  
Smith and Irene Kime.

## The Santa Clara Wrecked At Coos Bay Entrance

The steamer Santa Clara, of the  
N. P. S. S. Line, bound in from  
Portland, was wrecked at the en-  
trance to Coos Bay last Tuesday  
afternoon and the latest reports in-  
dicate that nine persons lost their  
lives. The vessel is a total loss and  
lies close to shore at Bastendorf  
beach, and as she has not yet bro-  
ken up some of her cargo has been  
recovered in a damaged condition.

The steering gear of the steamer  
went wrong after she had crossed  
the bar, and she took a sheer and  
struck on the south spit, where she  
grounded and stuck for some time.  
While she lay there several boats  
were lowered and sent away. The  
first contained women and children  
and this boat was capsized in the  
surf when about half way to the  
beach, and here is where the loss of  
life occurred.

Later, the boat pounded over the  
spit and into floating water in the  
channel which is sometimes used  
by the small gasoline boats to enter  
without crossing the bar. She  
drifted across this and grounded  
again, this time near enough to the  
shore that a line was put aboard  
and those remaining were safely  
landed with the breeches buoy. She  
now lies so close in that she can be  
easily boarded at low water, but at  
high water the seas sweep over her  
if there is any considerable surf.

As to the cause of the failure of  
the steering gear there is a conflict  
of evidence. Some of those on  
board assert positively that she  
struck twice while crossing the bar,  
while the captain and other officers  
are as positive that she did not. It  
seems certain that if she struck she  
must have been out of the channel,  
for there is 30 feet of water on the  
bar at this time according to steam-  
boat men who have made careful  
soundings in crossing and know  
what they are talking about. One  
of the shipwrecked passengers as-  
sured The Herald man that he felt  
the boat strike bottom heavily twice,  
but a boat of the Santa Clara's  
draft would hardly find bottom in  
thirty feet at any time when the  
bar was not too rough to be crossed.

It is also stated by some that the  
Santa Clara was badly in need of  
repairs and that the steering gear  
had given trouble before, by jam-  
ming at sea. This may be only to  
shield the captain from the suspi-  
cion of being out of the channel.

In any case, it is evident that the  
disaster was not because of any dif-  
ficulty in safely crossing the Coos  
Bay bar, for she could not have  
struck bottom in the channel, and  
if the steering gear was defective it  
was not the fault of the bay.

So far as reported none of the  
lives lost were those of Coos county  
people. The number of passengers  
aboard was fifty, according to the  
lists published in the Marshfield  
papers.

Several Coquille merchants lost  
goods in the wreck, and The Her-  
ald had some supplies on board that  
are badly needed.

As is always the case beach  
combers were early on the scene,  
but Sheriff Johnson sent a guard  
and the steamship company also  
put men out to watch and prevent  
acts of piracy. Had the vessel  
broken up immediately there would  
have been rich pickings on the  
beach.

Cat" Ed Bowman, (Terror to Wild

fair sex. Ed was in town last week  
looking very happy and acting as  
though he never knew a wild cat

## Will Go South

P. M. Hall-Lewis intends to leave  
here on the 27th of this month to  
be gone at least all winter. He has  
resigned his office as roadmaster of  
this county, and goes to take the  
position of assistant engineer on ir-  
rigation works at Modesto, Cal., go-  
ing later to similar work in the  
Imperial valley. He says he will take  
up the large number of rose bushes  
that he has been cultivating here  
and will have them set out on land  
he owns in Butte county, where he  
will have them cared for.

Prevention of Tuberculosis, with  
headquarters at 503 Corbett Bldg.,  
Portland, Ore., was organized dur-  
ing July, for the purpose of preven-  
tive, educational and relief lines of  
work. The objects of the associa-  
tion are:

1. Dissemination of knowledge  
concerning the causes, treatment  
and prevention of tuberculosis.
2. Investigation of the preva-  
lence of tuberculosis in the state of  
Oregon and the collecting and pub-  
lishing of useful information.
3. Securing of proper legislation  
for the relief and prevention of tu-  
berculosis.

4. Co-operation with the public  
authorities, state and local Boards  
of Health, the National Associa-  
tion for the Study and Prevention  
of Tuberculosis, medical societies,  
and other organizations in approved  
measures adopted for the preven-  
tion of disease.
5. Promotion of the organiza-  
tion and work of such local socie-  
ties as may be needed.
6. Encouragement of adequate  
provision for consumptives by the  
establishment of sanatoria, dispen-  
saries and otherwise.

The Oregon Association is a  
branch of the "National Ass'n.  
for the Study and Prevention of  
Tuberculosis." This branch is at  
present planning two campaigns:  
namely, the observance of Tubercu-  
losis Day and the Red Cross Seal  
Sale. It is the earnest desire of the  
Oregon Association to put seals  
within the reach of everyone in  
Oregon who wishes to buy them.  
No locality is too small to take  
part. Everyone can help. Each  
community should have a supply.  
Order now. The sale begins Decem-  
ber 1st, closing Christmas Eve.

## New Moose Lodge Is Installed In This City

about fifty strong and instituted  
the Ko Keel Loyal Order of Moose.

Fifty members from this place  
were taken in and initiated by the  
Bandon lodge. The officers were  
installed also by the Bandon team.

Those installed were the follow-  
ing: Frank Leslie, past dictator;  
Walter Oerding, dictator; Andy  
Davis, vice dictator; Aaron Wilson,  
prelate; A. B. Collier, secretary;  
Harry Oerding, treasurer; Glen  
Shores, inside guard; James Brock-  
man, outside guard; W. J. Fer-  
brache, sergeant at arms; trustees,  
Alf Johnson, Ira Bumgardner and  
C. I. Kime.

After the installation a large and  
sumptuous banquet was indulged  
in. The meeting broke up about 2  
a. m., but upon going to the boat  
the Bandonians were informed that  
they could not depart for some time  
on account of the dense fog on the  
river, making it dangerous to travel.

boat at 4 a. m. broke up the fun,  
and they set out upon their home-  
ward journey.
