The Russ Lands

He says that as soon as plats and preliminary plans are completed the land will all be for sale in small tracts to anyone who wants them, and that the prices will be reasonable, as the Russ people want only a fair return on their investment. Pending the disposal of the land, use will be made of it in the cattle business, in order to make it keep up the interest and taxes.

Mr. Branstetter is enthusiastic as to the possibilities lying in the lands of this valley and which are seen by men who have had wide experience elsewhere and know what has been done in places where conditions were not nearly so favorable and with the coming influx of new people he expects to see great advances made here, in which expectation he will not be disappointed.
