A Silica Mine

Elisha Vernon, who is making his home with J. E. Quick, informs the Herald that he has made a discovery in Coos county of a ledge of silica, from which glass is made. Mr. Vernon, who says he is an old miner, states that he has developed the ledge by the sinking of four holes at different points and that it lies within 13 feet of the surface of the ground. He has sent a sample to a California expert, who reported that the silica showed 36 per cent silica and 2 per cent of iron. He does not give the location of the discovery, but says it is within a hundred yards of a wagon road and within 14 miles of the railroad. He is now seeking the assistance of capital for the development of the mine. Should this prove all that could be hoped, it would mean one of the big industries that will mean so much to Coos in the future.

Cake Some Traveler.

It is not often that one piece of cake travels 5,000 miles before reaching the "ultimate consumer," takes part in the celebration of the birth days of three persons whose ages aggregate 192 years, and fetches up within 75 miles of where it started from. Yet the Herald is told by C. C. Price of such an instance, Coquille having been one of the stopping places of the cake on its travels.

To give the story chronologically, on March 1st, Mrs. Mary E. Pickett, of Ft. Dodge, Iowa, baked a good fruit cake. She sent this, together with some candied ginger made in England, to her sister, Mrs. Price, of Ontario, Cal., as a present for her 80th birthday. Mrs. Price then sent a portion of the cake and some of the candy to her son, C. C. Price, of this city, to assist in the celebration of his 46th birthday, which occurs on April 23. Mr. Price then thought of an uncle now living in Marshalltown, Iowa, whose 76th birthday would occur on April 15, and he sent a share of his portion of both the cake and candy to the uncle, to form a part of the bill of fare at still another Price birthday, sending also a letter of congratulation and good wishes and giving the history and an account of the peregrinations of the cake.

The uncle, E. B. Price, was formerly a resident of Coos and kept the store and postoffice at Riverton some years ago, and he will be well and favorably remembered by many residents of this community, who will join in the wishes expressed by his nephew that there may be many more returns of April 15th for him and that they may be brought all the way through.

East Fork Items

The scheme to bond the county for road money and hold the tryout on primary election day is a great idea. A great idea to sit down on, for this bonding the county proposition is not good horse sense for if the county is bonded for \$400,000 at 6 per cent interest there is an interest graft of \$24,000 a year. If the county court would make one road district of the county, and the people vote a special ten mill tax that would give close to \$200,000 and two years of that kind of tax would give money and time to build roads and without a big war going into someone's pocket in the way of interest. No bonds let, at least, there will be a pretense made of spending all the money raised to build roads. Sure Coquille will buck the state engineer's office when it comes to building a bridge. And if I lived between Marshfield and Bandon I would buck the state engineer too when he put up a proposition that that was not a place to build a road for I can tell him that some day that part of Coos county will be beautiful and productive farms, Sunset Bay, Norton's Gulch, and Shore Acres are beauty spots and "tourists" will remember, and it seems to be the idea of some that we are to pay taxes to build roads for "tourists." It strikes me that the thing to do is to build roads for the every day sort of folks who use the roads.

Commercial Club

Backs Lyceum

At the meeting of the Commercial Club last Tuesday evening, two matters were up for consideration. The one in which it would seem the business community would be the more interested came second, when the new passenger transfer station at Cedar Point, established by the S. P. and the Panter river steamers, was considered.

For the sentiment which had found such ready expression on the street corners, it seems there was only one spokesman at the meeting—J. A. Lamb. That gentleman expressed strong disapproval of the new arrangement, whereby passengers between Coos Bay and Bandon were shut back and forth between the railroad and the steamer without being brought here to view the grass which grows in our streets, as Mr. Y expressed it. President Norton referred to Mr. Lamb with the statement that the present arrangement was only temporary. He also spoke for the interest of Bandon in getting its mail early, some time being saved by the transfer at Cedar Point. Agent Paul Sterling also stated that the present arrangement was only intended to be temporary and to prevail until the completion of the Umpqua bridge. Warren Panter also spoke to the same effect and read a letter received from W. F. Miller of the same tenor. The matter was then dropped.

The other business coming before the meeting was a proposal from the Elton-White Lyceum Bureau, of Salem, to furnish a course of four entertainments during the coming year at an expense of some \$300. This was a matter of more interest to the community, and it was taken up with a vim. A committee was appointed, consisting of C. A. Howard, J. J. Stanley and H. O. Anderson, to confer with the business men and get a guarantee that would justify the making of a contract with the lyceum bureau.

Later these gentlemen made a canvass of the town and received support enough to guarantee the expense, and it is settled that the course of entertainments will be given here next winter.

Elliott Players Thursday

The Elliott Players will appear at the Scenic Thursday night in their first engagement. They have established a weekly circuit of the county play houses and will be at the Scenic every Thursday. Edson Elliott and other members of the company are well known to the theatre goers of the county, from their former work with the Margaret lies Co., and in later work, and the people will no doubt be glad to see them again. A full performance will be given and no pictures will be shown that evening. Popular prices will prevail, 25 cents for adults and 10 cents for children.

Moose Entertain

Thursday night the Coquille Order of Moose had a basket social, and installation work. A very large crowd attended. Many baskets were sold which were brought by the ladies present. Those who were not fortunate enough to secure a basket were served with a nice lunch at midnight. Gus Bender and Don Donaldson furnished several musical numbers after midnight lunch was served. Ed Moon recited a very pleasing piece and Aaron Wilson rendered a couple of late song hits. Every one present enjoyed themselves and departed at a very late hour, hoping that the Moose would repeat the performance at a very early period.

To Make Good Road

Work will soon be inaugurated on the largest road contract ever let in this county, by which E. G. Perham undertakes to make a real road of the Marshfield-Coquille trail between Coaledo and Davis slough. While the exact figure for the work is not set, it will amount to about \$63,000, and its completion will not be seen this season.

As all who are familiar with the road are aware, this section of some four miles is the worst part of the road between the two towns. The road was laid out many years ago, when gasoline was not thought of as a motive power for vehicles, when road money was scarce, and when some kind of a road that could be traveled by horses between the Bay and the Coquille was imperatively needed. The road therefore followed the path of easiest construction and short turns and steep pitches make up a great part of its length. Short stretches of the worst have been relocated of late years, as the money was available, but now the road must be located on a route and grade of its own, and practically all of the old work must become merely a matter of history. From the lay of the land, which permits almost a water level route, it being necessary to surmount the Isthmus divide of some 80 feet, there is nothing to prevent now getting an excellent grade, and while the road may be far from straight the turns will be long, and with plenty of width it will be an excellent piece of the thoroughfare.
