Corn Industry Developed

"Corn production in Oregon under scientific methods showed results last year that were almost startling," said Professor R. D. Hetzel in reviewing the work of the county agriculturalists. "A very large increase in both the acreage and yield of corn was secured. For example, Malheur county in Eastern Oregon, where corn had been practically unknown, produced 120 bushels to the acre and averaged 80 bushels to the acre in a county wide corn contest. Also in Tillamook county, a coast section, 60 tons of corn ensilage were raised on the best acre in the corn contest."

Caucus Names Ticket With Usual Mixups

Wednesday evening the caucus called for the purpose of nominating candidates for city offices, was held at the court house and drew a large attendance. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Morrison. Judge James Watson was made chairman and J. E. Norton secretary. Mayor Morrison placed E. E. Johnson in nomination for mayor and there was no other nomination made.

The nominations for three councilmen to serve for two years was held at the meeting. L. H. Hazard nominated H. N. Lorenz. A. J. Sherwood nominated W. H. Lyons, but Mr. Lyons declined. C. W. Gardner and Earl Godwin were then nominated. M. O. Hawkins was nominated for the one year term.

For city recorder, J. E. Norton placed J. S. Lawrence in nomination and C. A. Gage nominated Mrs. Claude Ford. Frank Burkholder moved that nominations be closed and the caucus proceed to ballot on the two candidates. A. J. Sherwood moved to amend by making both candidates named the nominees of the caucus. This precipitated the question that is so old yet ever new: can the caucus nominate two or more candidates for the same office? This question always arises at every caucus held in this city or Marshfield, and probably every other small town in Oregon. It always comes up as something new, never encountered before and upon which everybody is at sea. It is always discussed for at least an hour, the same speakers saying the same things in the same language. It is a time-honored custom, universally observed, and no well regulated caucus could be held without it. It always comes out at the same place, at the conclusion that more than one candidate can be nominated. That was the conclusion reached this time, and the chairman put the amendment to a vote which carried it. Then the other phenomenon developed; that forty chairmen out of fifty will get balked up when an amendment is made to a motion, and will fail to steer the meeting to an anchorage. Chairman Watson forgot to put the motion, as amended, but declared the two candidates to be the nominees of the caucus, and no further action was taken.

As the motion, as amended, was not adopted, no nominations were technically made, and the two candidates have been put to the inconvenience of chasing around town with petitions in order to get onto the official ballot. Both have done this, so the ticket will be as above indicated.

Track Meet Saturday

The Bandon, Myrtle Point and Coquille high schools will contend for athletic honors on the Lyons field in North Coquille next Saturday afternoon. An interschool track meet has never before been held in Coquille and considerable enthusiasm and interest have been aroused in this event. Coquille has better track prospects than ever before and the boys are hopeful of carrying off the honors in this contest.
