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BONDS WIN

Coos County Catches Step In Column of Progress

The political function pulled off last Friday was, in the words of the poet, a howling success. The great issue before the people of Coos county was decided right, and the bond issue was carried by a majority of seven to eight hundred.

Liljeqvist wins for prosecuting attorney by a handsome majority over his two opponents. Smith wins for state senator by about two to one. Kendall concedes his defeat by Peck for Representative. Johnson takes the nomination for sheriff by about two and one-half to one over the combined votes of Shields and Barklow. Beyers walked away from Nosler for assessor by about 500 votes. Baker seems to be safe for superintendent by about 200 votes. Henderson and McCulloch, for surveyor, are close. Harigan and Phillip, for commissioner, are also close.

Coquille did her duty by the bonds, nearly three to one, and Bandon did better than that. Myrtle Point was the only town of any size to go against them. Powers beat us all by going over four to one for the bonds.

Leland Stanford university, is one of the fastest mile runners to be found in any college in the U. S. His time is close to four minutes in that event. This month he will compete at Harvard in the meet to be held there for the Intercollegiate championship of America, and also at a dual meet at Ann Arbor, Mich. He has never been defeated in the mile run and has been up against the fastest men from the Pacific coast to Boston. He is six feet, three inches tall and weighs 175 pounds and is a son of whom his parents can feel justly proud.

Wilson won the one mile race for Stanford in the meet against Michigan and set a new record for the Michigan track. The time was four minutes nineteen seconds.
