JOURNAL TO RUN SPECIAL

Carries 100 and Will Come To Coquille

The Portland Journal is to run a special train into Coos county for the big celebration August 24, 25 and 26. In speaking of the train the Journal says in part:

The Journal has just made arrangements for a solid Pullman special train to Marshfield, which will be limited to the first one hundred persons who make reservations at the office of the Journal or at the Southern Pacific ticket office, Sixth and Oak. Not only will the Journal's Coos Bay special carry its passengers to and from Marshfield, but it will serve as their hotel during the three days stay in the south, also.
The cost for the entire trip will be only \$25. This one charge covers transportation, berth, meals, and everything else from the hour the train pulls out of Portland on the night of August 23 until its return at 8 a. m. Sunday, August 27.

The same equipment that comprises the crack Shasta Limited will be used in making up the special. In addition to electrically lighted Pullmans, the train will carry an observation car and a big diner, where will be served meals of the kind for which the Journal's Pendleton Round-Up specials are famous. A baggage car will also be attached.
The celebration committee is arranging for excursions to every part of the county and visitors will be treated to banquets, clam bakes and auto rides among other things.
The first day's celebration will be held at North Bend. The second is allotted to Coos county as a whole. Excursions will be made to Coquille, Bandon, Myrtle Point, Powers and to the ocean beaches.

Former Coquille Boy Killed at Marshfield

Ellery Davis, aged thirteen, was almost instantly killed Sunday afternoon by a fall from the Libby bunkers. He dropped about thirty feet, struck his head on the corner of a small building and rolled into the Bay. He was unconscious when picked up and taken to Mercy hospital where he soon succumbed, his skull having been crushed.
The lad was playing with some other boys, the latter being on the ground. According to one story, they were throwing pieces of coal at each other and it is presumed that in dodging, he made a misstep and fell.
The mother, Mrs. C. B. McCullum, is in poor circumstances. She is a widow. They live near the junction of the Coquille road.
The family moved from Roseburg to Coquille last year and came to Bunker Hill in November. There are three other boys. Levi who is at home and is crippled as a result of a stroke of paralysis; Roscoe Davis who works on the section at Coquille, and Harrison Davis who is employed in a logging camp near Astoria.—Coos Bay Times.
