John Kudrna Fatally Shot by His Son

By the accidental discharge of a rifle in the hands of his son on the evening of the Fourth, John Kudrna, who lived on Rink creek, was fatally wounded, and his death occurred on the evening of the 6th. The two were out hunting together and both had been shooting at a deer. The boy was behind and his gun was discharged, striking his father in the back, the 25 30 bullet striking the spine and passing through the body and left arm. The boy went for help and the injured man was brought in after several hours had passed. He was taken to Grayce hospital, where he lingered for two days, although Dr. Culin who attended him had no hopes for his recovery.

The funeral was held Saturday from the Catholic church, and burial was made in the Masonic cemetery. Kudrna was a native of Bohemia and was about 50 years of age. He leaves a wife and eight children in poor circumstances.
