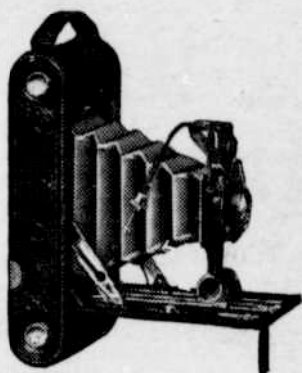

Hermann District Will Build

The Hermann school district, recently enlarged by combination, will enlarge the school building to accommodate the increased attendance. One room will be added, together with cloak rooms, etc., and other improvements made, giving a good modern two-room building. Having determined to have the work done, the people of the district will not wait until a tax is voted before starting, but have had plans drawn and will let the contract on the guarantee of the practically unanimous community. Such indications of the live modern spirit, which occur with increasing frequency among the Coos county school districts, are most encouraging to friends of education, leaving no doubt that Coos county school patrons and taxpayers have resolved to give this section the best schools to be found in Oregon.

Playshed Contract Let

At a meeting of the school board yesterday afternoon E. W. Gregg was awarded a contract for building a playshed at the Academy building at a cost of \$165. The building is to be 30x50 feet with single roof and enclosed on three sides. Ever since it has been necessary to use the entire building for

class room purposes a playshed has been greatly needed and parents of children who are to attend school at the Academy will be greatly pleased that one is to be built.

Local and School Fair Held at Parkersburg

A local and school fair was held at Parkersburg last Friday, and while it did not eclipse the Railroad Jubilee it was a very creditable affair to the community and especially to the school. About 250 people were present, some of them from Bandon and up-river points.

Two exhibits were on display in the school house, one a community exhibit and the other a school exhibit. The former was placed in the larger of the two rooms and the other in the smaller. As these occupied the building, seats and platform were erected on the school grounds, and here a program was rendered, including numbers by the school pupils and address by Professor E. S. Pittman, head of the department of rural schools of the Oregon Normal. After the entertainment baskets and lunches were sold, and the people enjoyed a good social time. The yard was lighted up with bonfires, and the interior of the building was illuminated by Chinese lanterns.

There were about 100 articles in the school exhibit and about 50 in the community exhibit, the children improving noticeably on their work of last year and rather eclipsing their parents. The teachers in the school are J. B. Bedingfield, principal, and Elsie Kinley. In his address, Prof. Pittman complimented the school highly and said it was as near his idea of a perfect rural school as any he had found. Prof. Bedingfield is enthusiastic as to the benefit of such exhibitions and fairs, to the work of the pupils and the good of the school. He says that those pupils who have taken up some project or have tried for a prize at the county fair have invariably done better work in agriculture or made better grades than those who have not, and it has also helped in drawing the attention of parents to the school work. It will be remembered that Parkersburg took the best prize for rural school exhibit at the county fair last year, and it is evident that such work had a good effect on the work of the school.

Dr. Hamilton Appointed

Dr. V. L. Hamilton has been appointed county health officer by the county court to fill the unexpired term of the late Walter Culin. The appointment was made August 18, and his term expires on June 30, 1917. Dr. Hamilton came to Coquille about three years ago and since that time has built up a large practice. After the death of Dr. Culin, Dr. Hamilton was endorsed by the Republican Central Committee to fill the vacant office.
