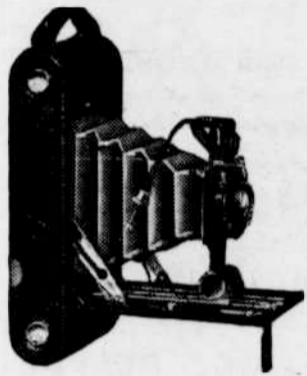

## Burns Result in Death

Mrs. Riggs, an inmate of the county infirmary who was about ninety years of age, received burns Sunday that resulted in her death yesterday, when her clothes caught fire from the open door of a stove. The old lady had been in the habit of opening the door of the stove in order to get more heat from it and then standing close to it to get warm. She had been warned that she should not do it but Sunday when every one else was out of the room she repeated the action and her clothes caught fire resulting in her being badly burned before her cries brought assistance. A doctor was called at once to attend to her wounds and Miss Mable Billings, a trained nurse, was summoned from Marshfield. Yesterday, however, Mrs. Riggs passed away, in spite of all being done that was possible to save her life.
