High School Basket Ball Team Has First Try-Out

The Coquille High school basketball team had its first try-out of the season when it played at Norway last Saturday night, and while the score was 23 to 19 in favor of Norway, local basket ball enthusiasts are much encouraged by the showing made. The high school team is small and has had but little experience; the Norway team is heavier and for the most part the players are much more familiar with the game.

As the first half of the game at Norway progressed, things looked bad for the high school team; their passing was reasonably good but a nervousness seemed to prevail among the players that made their attempts at baskets pitifully wild. It is not improbable that the condition of the hall had something to do with this. Only one field basket was scored by the Coquille team in the first half and when time was called the score stood 13 to 4.

The second half was a different story, however, and it looked for a time as though the game would go for Coquille after all. Twice the score was tied and only by fouls called on Coquille were the Norway players able to keep them from forging ahead. It was not until during the last few minutes of play that Norway scored a field basket, when they shot two in rapid succession.

Coquille line-up was Stanley, center, Chas. Oerding and Lorenz, guards, and John Oerding and Crouch, forwards. Julian Leslie refereed the game. A number of students attended the game and the dance that followed.

Oregon Has Problem

That Oregon has a tuberculosis problem is suggested in the survey of four counties that has just been completed by the Oregon Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis.

The Oregon Association, which is a unit of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis,



will make a survey and report upon the conditions in respect to tuberculosis in every county of Oregon.

The first figures cover the survey of Clatsop, Josephine, Lane and Jackson counties. The information is so comprehensive, accurate and searching that Dr. David N. Roberg, Secretary of the State Board of Health, wrote to the Oregon Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis:

"These figures and information relative to the counties of Oregon as you will assemble it, will be made a part of the records of the Oregon State Board of Health and will be included in our annual report. No service has ever been of greater value to the health of the people of Oregon than this which is only one of many activities which I know your organization to have engaged in for the destruction of tuberculosis in this great state. From tables scientifically computed by the Russell Sage Foundation it has been determined that tuberculosis should comprise 12 per cent of all activities of a State Board of Health."

Sunday Rest Movement

A deep interest has been created in the question of Sunday rest ordinances by the two addresses delivered on Friday night and Sunday morning by Dr. G. L. Tufts, of Postland. He said in part:

"Man is so constituted that he requires one day of rest each week to maintain good health. The seven-day per week worker dies ten years younger on the average than the six-day worker.

"Business houses which operate on Sundays do seven days work for six days profits, and increase their overhead expenses.

The Science Club will meet every two weeks on Friday afternoons, at which time a program will be given by the members. The first program will be held Dec. 29. The numbers will appear in next week's Herald. A Christmas tree will be secured for this meeting and Santa Claus has promised to be on hand.

Club Receives Maps

Secretary Young of the Commercial Club was busy yesterday distributing among the members of that organization maps prepared to accompany the report which the Columbia River Project made to the Oregon state legislature in 1915. There are two of these maps and they contain a great deal of valuable and interesting information.

One of the maps classifies the land as taxed and untaxed and shows that approximately 60 per cent of the land of Oregon is not subject to taxation. Oregon county has the greatest per cent of its land on the tax rolls there being less than two per cent that is not taxed; while Klamath, with 83.6 per cent not taxed, has the least. Coos county taxes all its land except 27.8 per cent. According to these maps, there are 159,959 acres in the state devoted to national parks, 1,275,114 acres included in Indian reservations, 15,580,934 acres in forest reserves, and 26,561 acres in coal reserves. The O. & C. grant comprises 2,400,000 acres, the public domain is 18,545,582 acres and the state school lands total 541,905 acres.

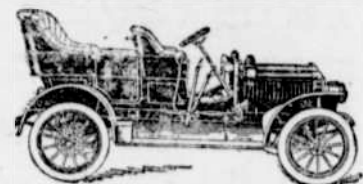
