Ship Fish East.

Coquille is in a good way to become a collecting and shipping point for fish from this part of the county, according to C. Heyes, who has been here since December 13, in the interest of the Burke Fish Company, of Portland. During that time Mr. Heyes has shipped one cold storage car of fish to the Atlantic seaboard and expects to ship another before the end of the week. The fish that go to make up these shipments are gathered from all parts of the county and some of them even from Curry. Coquille being the most central shipping point is used as a headquarters by Mr. Heyes and the fish are all placed in the cars here.

Mr. Heyes says his company is the only one on the coast that maintains their own halibut fleet, and adds that two more boats will be added to this line of their enterprise during the coming spring. One of them is building at Siuslaw now.

According to Mr. Heyes the coming of the railroad and the possibilities for rapid transportation means much to the local fishermen. He explains this by the fact that since the railroad is here the large fish buying concerns are coming in here and that in competing for the trade are giving the fishermen better prices for their product than ever before. Just an instance of this was given Saturday when the price of fish jumped to 10 cents owing to the competition in buying.

Mr. Heyes expects to be here permanently and has established his headquarters at the Collier Warehouse. He went to Bandon yesterday on business for his company.

POOR ROADS AND FARMS.

No sane person will dispute the economic value of good roads. Look about your native town and you will find that those farms or houses located on a well kept public highway possess a higher valuation than places less favorably situated. When these are for sale they command a better price, and a purchaser is not difficult to find. There are many farms so located that because of poor roads and the difficulties of transportation they cannot market their crops to advantage. The amount of their sales is less than the cost of marketing farm produce. This is one reason why so much of our New England farm land is allowed to run to waste, and it accounts in a large measure for so many abandoned farms. They do not pay, and poor roads figure largely in the case. Margaret Woodward in Countryside Magazine.

GOOD HEALTH AND ROADS.

National Highways Association Head Shows Their Relation.

That good roads are conducive to good health is one of the best arguments advanced by Charles Henry Davis, C. E., president of the National Highways association, in favor of good roads. He says:

"Given the same density of population, the town with better roads has the smallest percentage both of disease and deaths. When statistics show this is almost invariably the case, there must be some connection between good roads and health."

"It is true that a town with good roads is a progressive town, with a health board that is correspondingly well informed and alert, but it is also true that good roads have directly contributed to the progressive spirit. In short, money has rolled in over their well kept surfaces. Through them the town has become wealthier and wiser, and better health protection is a natural result."

Again he says: "A community to be wholly healthy must not be a queer community. It must take a sane interest in its business and the relation of its business to the outside world. It must mix with other people besides its own immediate neighbors. In other words, it must come out of itself, and to do this it must look to its roads."

"Where the roads are heavy, narrow, muddy and impassable the community becomes segregated—a quiet backwater, quaint but useless in our national progress and sometimes queer and dangerous. It becomes the breeding place of insanity and perversion, a cancerous and vexed spot of mental ills and moral contagion that spreads as rapidly and leaves as sanguinary effects as any of the epidemics known to medicine."

ROAD WORK FOR PRISONERS.

Enables Many Districts to Improve Highways at Low Expense.

Road work affords a means of making the family deserter support his wife and children. California by statute provides that deserters and other misdemeanants shall be worked by the counties upon the roads and a sum not exceeding \$1.50 a day be paid to their dependents for the work.

Miss Beatrice McCall of the woman's protective bureau of Oakland has reported to the national committee on prisons that Los Angeles and Sacramento counties are enforcing this provision and employing their prisoners in road work. The bureau is endeavoring to have the statute enforced in Oakland county.

The movement to work county prisoners on public roads is also gaining ground in Louisiana.

New Orleans passed an ordinance in 1907 providing for such work. Other counties have leased their prisoners under the lease system, abolished as far as state prisoners are concerned by the constitution of the state. W. O. Hart, president of the Louisiana Prison Reform association, has informed the national committee on prisons that the association is introducing a bill into the next session of the legislature to abolish the lease system even for county prisoners and extend the New Orleans system to other counties.

Kalamazoo county, Mich., freed itself of tramps by establishing road camps for county prisoners. Salem county, N. J., found the road camp a means of overcoming crowded conditions in the jail. Georgia finds road work a successful means of employing practically all her county prisoners.

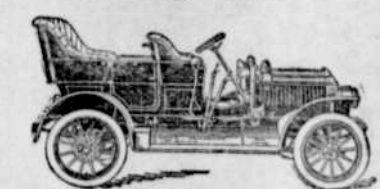
