

Potato Seed

In yield per acre, the potato crop of this country is just where it was fifty years ago. Increase in production has been due to increase in acreage rather than greater yields. During the first twenty-five years of this period there was a great decrease in yields, and during the last twenty-five years the ground lost has just been regained. The decline in yield is due to "run out" seed stock, uncontrolled disease, and the ravages of insect pests. The upward trend is due to seed selection, and in a measure to disease control and the united effort of growers in many sec tions to improve the crop. The average yield per acre is still less than one half what the best growers are getting. Do potatoes "run out?" This question might be answered by asking,

election and mating are neglected?" The best time to select potato seed in in the field during the growing season so as to harvest these potatoes before main digging. Hill selection is the safest and best method, but improvenent can be made if the seed potatoes are sorted out from the bins now. Do not wait until you have used potatoes from the bin all winter for household
