Ruth Stonehouse, Star

Potato Seed

In yield per acre, the potato crop of this country is just where it was fifty years ago. Increase in production has been due to increase in acreage rather than greater yields. During the first twenty-five years of this period there was a great decrease in yields, and during the last twenty-five years the ground lost has just been regained. The decline in yield is due to "run out" seed stock, uncontrolled disease, and the ravages of insect pests. The upward trend is due to seed selection, and in a measure to disease control and the united effort of growers in many sections to improve the crop. The average yield per acre is still less than one-half what the best growers are getting.

Do potatoes "run out"? This question might be answered by asking, "Does livestock run down where proper selection and mating are neglected?"

The best time to select potato seed is in the field during the growing season so as to harvest these potatoes before the main digging. Hill selection is the safest and best method, but improvement can be made if the seed potatoes are sorted out from the bins now. Do not wait until you have used potatoes from the bin all winter for household purposes. Do not pick out the big ones especially, but those of medium size, smooth, and free from disease.

In sorting potatoes pick out any that have started to rot. When first put into the bin potatoes are likely to rot. This starts the germination of spores of different rots that are found on the potatoes in the field. One rotten potato may cause several others to rot before spring. After sorting them over and picking out the seed stock, be sure to store the seed where it will be kept cool to avoid sprouting. The seed should be kept in this condition until planting time. The first sprout the potato sends out is the strong one and all efforts should be made to cool down the storage room to prevent any sprouting until just before planting time.

You cannot plant cut seed and harvest high-grade potatoes. The premium for good seed potatoes is from twenty-five to fifty cents a hundred weight. In order to get this there must be quality. Why not start this selection this year and carry on some hill selection for improvement the coming season?
