Higher Price for License
Game Warden Thomas was a business visitor here Saturday. He gave some valuable information concerning some of the game laws recently passed. Under the new law a woman is allowed to fish without a license, but must have a license to hunt. Any person may purchase a hunting or fishing license at the price of \$1.00 up to May 20. After that they will be \$1.50.

Deer season opens August 15, closes October 15. Bag limit is reduced to two (buck) deer.

Open season all over the state, on migratory birds, will hereafter be from October 1 to January 15.

No person or persons shall make use of a dog in hunting any game animal in the state. Any dog running at large in territory inhabited by deer, or found following upon track of any game animal, after the owner has been notified in writing by an officer entrusted with the enforcement of the game laws, may be declared a public nuisance and killed by any game warden or other person entrusted with the enforcement of the game laws, without criminal or civil liability.

Mr. Thomas captured a duck hunter on one of the sloughs on the Bay, last week. The hunter made a sneak on a flock of ducks just at daylight and killed five. He was afraid to take chances on picking them up, and let them lay all day so he could pick them up under cover of darkness. When he came to pick them up he was gathered in by the game warden. He will be the first man in the county to be prosecuted under the Federal game law. While Mr. Thomas sympathizes with the hunter on account of short seasons, etc., he nevertheless enforces the laws, and plays no favorites, which facts have won him the universal respect of the hunters.
