Worth Knowing

Cover grease spots on carpet with flour and then pin a thick paper over. Repeat the process several times, each time brushing off the old flour and putting on fresh.

By rubbing a fresh lemon thoroughly into a sour sponge and rinsing it several times in lukewarm water it will become as sweet as when new.

Many valuable vases have been broken because the flowers made it top heavy. This can be easily remedied by pouring a few cents' worth of shot, which may be obtained from any hardware store, in the bottom of your vase. Woolen articles shrink less if they are not rinsed. Wash them in two lots of soapy water, adding a little blue to the last; then put them through the wringer and shake them well.

A pinch of common lime is often boiled with old potatoes, and in no way does it injure the vegetable. It is not unhealthy, and the potatoes are whiter.

Knives are cleaned more easily and thoroughly with soda added to the scouring brick.

Douglas fir is the chief tree species used by the Forest Service in its tree planting operations in Oregon and Washington. Noble fir, western yellow pine, and western white pine were also used in the 1916 operations.

Printer's Art Display

University of Oregon, Eugene.—On exhibition in the display room of the architecture building of the University is a collection of samples of the printer's art, regarded as one of the finest ever shown in the west. This exhibit, obtained by the cooperation of Prof. Allen Eaton, instructor in art appreciation, and the the school of journalism, was brought all the way from the Atlantic coast. Last fall it was shown at the annual convention of the United Typothetae and Franklin Clubs of America at Atlantic City, and Mr. Eaton journeyed from Philadelphia to see it. The public generally and Oregon printers in particular are invited to view the exhibit, which will be kept on exhibition for one more week, including Sunday afternoon.

Particular appeal is made to Oregonians by a display of the work of Frederick G. Cooper, noted advertising cartoonist. This native of McMinnville, Ore., is now recognized among the leaders of his craft in America. Included in the exhibit are samples of the work of 75 of the leading printing houses of the country in letter heads, announcements, catalogues,

booklets, menu cards and pictures which represent the latest advance in color printing.

After the close of the exhibit here, this work will be sent back immediately to New York City. The display will not be shown anywhere else in the west.

Short Course Work

"The O. A. C. Short Course work is so practical that it fits all the varying conditions in the State," said H. A. Darnall, a farmer-student and former editor of the Mt. Scott Herald and Oregon Grange Bulletin.

"This local adaptation is secured in two ways; in the first place, the specialists in the different lines of work are so familiar with local conditions throughout the State that they see at once how all general scientific principles have to be modified to suit each important center. Secondly, they were ready at all times to hear questions bearing on local conditions, and answer them. When any farmer-student failed to see just how any general principles were to be adapted to his section, he had only to ask for this information to get it."

Mr. Darnall is desirous of helping to correct the wrong impression that he thinks prevalent concerning the nature of work given in the Short Courses. "If the Oregon farmers really knew how well the work is adapted to their own particular problems," said he, "there would be far more in attendance at short courses than could find room in the college."

Coos County Oratorical-Declamatory Contest

The County Oratorical-Declamatory Contest will be held in Coquille on Friday evening, April 20. Each of the five high schools of the county will be represented by a boy in the oratorical section of the contest and by a girl in the declamatory section. Coquille will be represented in the declamatory contest by Ada Downs who will present "Her First Appearance" by Richard Harding Davis. The local orator will be Arthur Hooton who will deliver an oration of "John Brown" by W. M. Thompson. Both are hard at work and the prospects that Coquille will again come into possession of one of the cups that are offered as prizes in these contests, are considered excellent. Heretofore, local judges have determined the winners of the contests. This year one judge outside the county will make the selection. Supt. W. R. Rutherford of the Eugene schools has been invited to act in this capacity but word has not yet been received as to whether or not he will be able to accept the invitation.

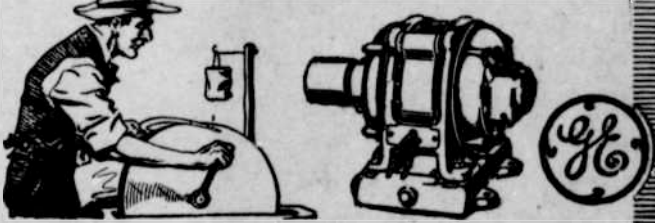
