Appropo of the accident on the Coquille-Roseburg road last week it has been suggested that the regular road law of turning to the right should perhaps be modified somewhat in some sections of this county. The suggested change would give to all horse teams the right of way over motor vehicles, allowing them the choice of turning either to the right or left when meeting an auto. This would give the privilege to horse vehicles of taking the inside of the road on bad grades or where there is danger of the team becoming frightened and backing or jumping off the roadway. The suggestion has much merit and should be taken up by the county court and passed to this effect posted on all the bad grades of the county.

The Coos county artillery company may be compelled to cancel its engagements with Uncle Sam unless some patriotic cook shall tender his services to that organization in the near future. This position must be filled before the company can leave for training camp, so if you are a cook and patriotic, here is your chance to give to your country not only your own services but those of the entire company as well. The cook must be a regularly enlisted man and must pass the regular examinations.
