Swamp Land Petition. Washington, Nov. 15.—Lengthy petitions have been presented by Congressman Hermann to Secretary Vilas, signed by settlers in Yamhill county, Oregon, who represent that they reside on lands in township 38 south, ranges 8 and 9 east; township 38 south, ranges 8 and 10 east; township 9 south, range 9 east, and are bona fide settlers thereon, under the homestead and pre-emption laws, and that large portions of said lands have been located and selected as swamp land by the state, through false representations as to their true character; that unscrupulous land monopolies have antagonized the rightful claims of the settlers and homesteaders, and they ask the interior department to institute a full and searching investigation to the end that their rights, as well as the rights of the state and general government, may be finally and equitably adjusted.

Scarcity of Pork. Pork is bringing a high price now. Our packer says that this time of year he usually has 3000 hogs packed, but this year he has only about 200. He says no one can afford to pay present prices for pork to pack.
