CIGARETTE MAKING IN CAIRO.

Important Facts Relating to a Dangerous Warranted "APHRODITINE" or money Commodity,

The bales are opened as required, and the various leaves mixed so that four different priced qualities result, the best kind being that in which there is the least Smyrna tobacco and the least percentage of large leaves. If cigarettes are made exclusively of the best leaves, which are light BEFORE generative or so TER in Alexandria this is not necessary. English made machines cut up the leaves, and on the following day the cigarettes are rolled by Greek, Syrian or Jewish workmen. A clever workman can roll as many as 1,500 a day. The cigarettes are then carefully over-The cigarettes are then carefully overhauled by an expert, left a week to dry, and then packed in tin boxes for sale. They should, of course, be smoked directly instead of being kept, as is too often the case in England.

So much for the tobacco; now for the paper. All large Cairo firms employ one kind of paper only, which is made by a half English company at Fiume, near Trieste. It comes to Alexandria in foolscap sheets, and is there cut up to the required size. It is not known how it is made, or whether it is chiefly rice straw; but the merchants here all vow that it is the best they can get. If one is right in sus-

Indignant Protest.
