

ENGLISH AND AMERICAN WAGES

facts that cotton and woolen weaving costs less per year for labor in the United States than in any European country. Wages are admitted to be generally higher, of-ten much higher, here by the day or week, but as our labor is more productive, a yard of cloth is actually woven more cheaply with us than in Europe. This is a fact officially certified to by the authorities at Washington under Repub-

lican administration. In 1882 our consuls in Europe were directed by Secretary of the Treasury F. T. Frelinghuysen to report upon the cotton and woolen weaving industries in their respective districts. Our consul at Manchester, England, Albert D. Shaw, re ported upon the cotton goods industry of Lancashire. In the course of his report he gave certain tables prepared by the late Mr. James Thornly, of Manchester,




