A Tomato Analysis. According to the investigations of

asserini the fresh fruit of tomatoes consists of 1.8 per cent skin, 96.2 per consists of 1.5 per cent skin, so.5 per cent pulp and juice, and 2.5 per cent seeds. The pulp contains two coloring matters, a yellow amorphous substance and a red crystalline substance. They are both insoluble in water, soluble in amyl alcohol, and very soluble in ether; and both are decolorized by chlorine water or bromine water. Cold alcohol lissolves the red crystals but slightly, while the yellow compound is very solu-ble. Hydrochloric acid has no action on either compound.
