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LATEST WASHINGTON NEWS.

Preparations for War with Chile. Chilean Officials Change Their Mind About the Refugees on the Yorktown.

Talk of preparations for war with Chile is still going on at the capital and throughout the country.

Secretary Tracy has received a cablegram from Commander Evans of the Yorktown saying the Chilean authorities had changed their minds in regard to the refugees on board the cruiser.

General Alger has suggested that a commission be sent to Chile, and, if possible, avert war, which would mean the sacrifice of 10,000 lives and \$300,000,000.

The report comes from Valparaiso that while the ship of Commander Evans of the United States cruiser Yorktown was lying at the wharf the sailors were stoned by a gang of ruffians.

The popular movement for the election of United States senators by a vote of the people is likely to be one of the most important subjects discussed by the present congress.

It is deemed probable that the ways and means committee of the house will make one very radical departure from the past practice of the committee.

The sense of the Democratic majority is clearly in favor of limiting the work of the committee to the preparation of a bill that would do away with the present system of electing senators.

Los Angeles proposes to own its own water works.

A gang of counterfeiters has been captured at Los Angeles, Cal.

William Cooper and John Harsh, aged 18 and 14, have been arrested at Walla Walla for robbing the postoffice at Hantville.

Foreman C. I. Phelps of the Mare Island navy yard is charged with making men pay for the privilege of working there. An investigation is in progress.

M. J. Shea, a section boss on the Southern Pacific, was nearly killed by three Chinese near Fresno.

Albert Frederick, twice sentenced to death at Seattle for the murder of Julius Scherbring, came near the gallows recently. The sheriff had made preparations for the execution and was about to carry it out when he received an order from Judge Humes of the supreme court to stay the execution as the case had been appealed.

Three tramps at Sedro, Wash., were charged with petty thievery and a crowd of them went up and down until two of them confessed, when they were imprisoned.

A large ledge of bituminous rock was discovered recently just within the city limits of Los Angeles.

In blasting the lava a spring of petroleum was discovered, which has been flowing steadily ever since.

An experiment fraught with great interest to Victoria, B. C., has been tried by a large firm in that city.

The delegates to the International League of Press Clubs convention at San Francisco received a royal welcome in California.

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The Northwestern Miller reports that the official output of flour by the Minneapolis mills during the year 1921 was 7,874,847 barrels.
