A Murderous Indian.

Jonah, a Klamath Indian, is in the Klamath Falls jail for the assassination of Dave Hill, the well-known Indian policeman and famous scout during the Modoc war, and Ben Wright, Jonah's uncle, a witness and accomplice in the Modoc war. The other day Jonah took a pump handle and beat Wright nearly to death, breaking Wright's nose and hand and putting him in the hospital. He was taken from the jail that Wright had fallen from the water tank, but he died. Jonah wanted to kill Wright and keep him from testifying against him at the term of court that convenes in June. A few days later Jonah made a desperate attempt to break out of the sheriff's cell, but he failed. He was taken to the jail and a pair of handcuffs.

GEN. MILLER'S NAMESAKE.

How a Pension School-Teacher Got a Start in Life. Klamath Falls Express.

There is a gentleman now connected with the schools at Pendleton, Or., who obtained his given name under circumstances that are worth recounting. The story has a local bearing, inasmuch as Gen. John F. Miller figures largely in the events to be narrated.

In August, 1835—immediately after the signing of the treaty with the Rogue River Indians—Gen. Miller, with a company of 115 men, was ordered by Gen. Lane to proceed from Jacksonville and protect the immigrants, constantly arriving over the southern Oregon route, from the attacks of the murderous Modocs.

Gen. Miller's company forded Klamath river near the mouth of Spencer creek and crossed Lost river on the natural bridge. Proceeding on to the canyon east of Clear Lake the General stopped overnight at the house of a Methodist minister named T. F. Royal. That night the wife of the minister's son presented her husband with a young boy who was promptly named Miller Royal, in honor of their guest and protector. In due time the soldiers, after various skirmishes with the redskins, reached Humboldt, Cal.

Miller Royal, when of sufficient age, attended school in Ashland, and completed his education at Salem. He came out of college without a cent, however, and in a letter to Gen. Miller disclosed the fact that he had received from the latter a sum of money.

PACIFIC COAST NOTES.

Napa has appropriated \$300 to entertain the visiting editors. E. S. Barlow of Tacoma has been appointed United States marshal at Klamath Falls.

Deputy Coroner A. J. Stetson of San Diego has been arrested on the charge of stealing money from a dead man. At Mount Angel, Marion county, Or., the monastery, church, carpenter shop and boarding mill of the Benedictine fathers were burned.

The steamer Monroe went on the rocks off the mouth of the Skagit river, Wash., and was wrecked. The passengers and crew were saved.

George W. Broggy, the condemned murderer, who escaped from prison at Santa Rosa, was recaptured in a canoe on Keys ranch, near Windsor.

Louis Howard, aged 18 years, at Napa, while riding on horseback and leaning over the side of the road, was in an accidental fall of the rope.

Dr. Frank R. Ballard of Fremont, near Seattle, has been released of the charge of conspiracy with the Radcliffe to defraud the insurance company.

Louis Sherman, well-known business man of Pomona, has disappeared. It has been impossible to find any trace of him and his friends are much alarmed.

W. C. Brooks, a pretty and bright 11-year-old boy, is in the County Jail at Ogden for horse stealing. He has been in jail five times. His mother is insane and his father was a burglar.

Upon invitation of the chamber of commerce Warner Miller, president of the Nicaragua Canal company, addressed the prominent citizens of Portland on the Nicaragua canal scheme.

The jury in the case of John D. Smith, who killed Percy Williams at Fresno, during a quarrel over a game of cards, more than one year ago, has disagreed and it is now believed that conviction is impossible.

British Columbia sealers are beginning to realize that the United States are in earnest, and they count on the British minister of marine to see that vessels are duly notified and not summarily dealt with, as by instructions given by Secretary Tracy.

County Court Judge Cornwall of Lillooet, B. C., has sentenced Father Chelouse to one year's imprisonment, Chief Kille-Poot-kin to six months and four Indians to two months each, for cruelly whipping an Indian girl who was caught with her paramour.

Judge Harris of Fresno, granted a writ of habeas corpus in the case of Thomas Dooley. The peculiar part of it was that a justice of the peace in Fresno sentenced of banishment against Dooley. The defendant returned to Fresno and was put in jail. The court held, in substance, that coming home from banishment was not a crime, for which a man should be sent to jail, and Dooley was accordingly released.

Thomas Brien, son of Philip Brien, a prominent citizen of Marshfield, Or., was accidentally shot and killed while hunting. Young Brien was accompanied by two companions, who say that Brien was standing upon a log when his gun slipped through his hand, the hammer striking the log and exploding the charges. The ball passed through Brien's chest and entered his lungs, razing upward. Brien was about 14 years old.

The Pomona Progress states that a bill that will have an important bearing upon the business of packing and shipping oranges and lemons from California has been prepared and will be introduced at the next session of the legislature. The bill will propose to make it a felony, punishable by fine or imprisonment for any individual, firm, association, corporation or company to put a brand upon boxes of lemons and oranges as indicating to the consumer that the fruit packed in said boxes come from a different locality, city or town than that in which it is packed and packed. The purpose of the bill will be to protect one locality or community that has made a reputation for its superior citrus fruits from the fraudulent branding of inferior fruit from other localities in order to get the prices that come to reputable and genuine that come from more remote localities.

A case involving the possession of a large portion of one of the most extensive ranches of Los Angeles county came up before a jury in Judge Van Dyke's court at Los Angeles. Los Angeles Farming and Milling company has a title to only 60,000 acres of the San Fernando ranch, and that the other 60,000 acres were obtained by fraud. They contend that the title to this 60,000 acres is in the United States, and that although the patent was granted in 1873 no limitations can run against the United States. They have applied to the attorney-general at Washington for permission to sue the United States name to sue the defendants and declare 60,000 acres a part of the public domain. The petition to the attorney-general is signed by 5000 people of Los Angeles. If the attorney-general does not grant the permission, congress will be petitioned. An action to try the title was brought by settlers in the United States court, a short while ago, but Judge Ross sent C. R. Bennett of Oakland, secretary of the society for the prevention of vice, is charged with a serious crime. Ella Gray, a young woman who sang in the same choir with Bennett, alleges that he betrayed her under promise of marriage; that when she was in a delicate condition he persuaded her to have a criminal operation performed. She did so and nearly lost her life. She further charges Bennett with persecuting her, causing her discharge from a position which she refused to have anything to do with him. Bennett is married.
