A report on the production of coal, compiled by E. W. Parker of the United States geological survey, shows that the production for the year to be 179,833,000 short tons, and the valuation \$205,257,000. California produced 72,600,000 tons, valued at \$117,500; Montana, 914,000 tons, valued at \$164,500; Utah, 413,300 tons, valued at \$211,000; Washington, 1,305,000 tons, valued at \$2,280,000; and Wyoming, 2,488,300 tons, valued at \$3,991,000.

The San Francisco detachment of the "Industrial Army," which was stranded at Ogden for a few days, took possession of a freight train on the Union Pacific and rode as far as Cheyenne. There were 1,200 men in the detachment when it left Ogden. Coxe's army passed through Pennsylvania last week and had a hard time of it. It may be of interest in this connection to state that Dr. Wilder, who has charge of this department of the university, has secured by written agreement the brains of some twenty professors of Cornell and prominent citizens of Ithaca (after their death) in the interest of science. The doctor has a regular printed form, which is signed by the donor and attested by a notary public. When Dr. Brenner was discovered dead a bullet wound was found in his temple and one in the forehead. This led to the belief that he had been shot. It is reported, however, claiming that it would be an utter impossibility for the suicide to have put more than one shot in his brain. When the brain was removed at the university two bullets were found embedded in the brain and destroyed the learned doctor's theory. They claim that this fact is an important discovery and of great interest to the medical world and criminal authorities.

ANXIETY IN WASHINGTON.

The Authorities Await the Arrival of Coxe's Army. The Washington authorities, civil and military, are taking active interest in the arrival of Coxe's army. At the Commonweal approaches and the stories of the detachments from various cities are being authenticated, the officers begin to look for the settlement of a difficult problem to be solved by the authorities. The question is: "What will be done with the Coxeites after they disembark? The individual members of the army will be without means to get out of the city, and General Coxe has disclaimed all intention of leading away the men he brings in. It begins to look as if the men might camp in the District and practically say to the authorities: "Here we are, and what do you propose to do with us?"

The district commissioners have had prepared a list of the statutes under which Coxe and his men could be dealt with. There is no lack of law. The laws against vagrancy, against bringing plagues on the capital ground of persons without a permit, are in force. Commissioner Ross, president of the board, thinks the authorities will not have any trouble in dealing with the army, and by lawyers, the provisions of the present law would establish. If distributed factions would form the habit of marching on the capital to enforce their demands he thought it would be disturbing to legislation and decidedly uncomfortable for the residents of the city.

There are 450 men on the local police force, but of course only a fraction of this body would be able to handle the Coxeites, and the provision would be necessary to call on the militia for assistance. There are 1,600 troops so well drilled that they can be massed in marching order in two hours.

MISS POLLARD WINS. The Jury Awards Her \$15,000 Damages Against Congressman Breckinridge. After three weeks of sensational testimony and one week of speeches in support of the suit of Madeline Pollard against Congressman Breckinridge for breach of promise has ended. The jury awarded Miss Pollard \$15,000 damages. She asked for \$50,000. Despite the verdict Breckinridge will run for reelection. Miss Pollard had had numerous offers to go on the stage, but has refused them all and says she will try to avoid publicity. It is asserted that Miss Pollard was enabled to sue for the breach of promise by the assistance of society women of the capital who sympathized with her and who claim that there is too much winking at in Washington. It is asserted that many congressmen are of the opinion that Breckinridge, and society has been compelled to overlook their immorality.

WEATHER.

The Pacific coast and the People's Home Savings bank at San Francisco, which suspended last July, are now receiving much attention from the newspapers. The McDonalds, who managed the banks, are accused of stealing the money entrusted to their care. An investigation of the savings bank by the bank commissioners is in progress.

Eighty-six hundred pounds of molten metal was scattered among 60 workmen at Pomeroy, O., in the Middleport steel plant. Not one of the men escaped. Pomeroy was killed and seven seriously injured. The hot metal scattered for 50 feet in all directions.

William A. Ash found George Ashworth hiding in his hay mow. Ashworth is the man who shot Mrs. Mason on March 26 last in the business portion of Indianapolis, Ia. Seeing that escape was impossible, he drew a revolver and shot himself in the temple, dying within two hours. Mrs. Mason still lives.

A cyclone swept the Atlantic coast a few days ago. The ships are reported. It will be days before the full extent of the loss of life and property will be known. The New Jersey coast is strewn with wreckage and many vessels are missing. So far 30 lives are reported lost, and many missing vessels are to be heard from.

Sergeant A. M. Wilson of the Salt Lake police force was shot accidentally and killed by Officer Tom Everett. The latter was going off duty and in putting his pistol away it struck the window of a saloon and was accidentally discharged. Wilson was struck in the knee, the ball ranging upward, and he died within a short time after he reached the hospital. The bullet struck in the business portion of Santa Cruz and in ashes. The fire was of incendiary origin. When the flames broke out the water was turned off because of a break in the pipe about a few feet from the saloon. The fire could be done half a mile of the business portion was devastated. Chinatown was completely burned out and the residents find some solace in the fact that the old rookeries and eyesores will be replaced by modern buildings. With one or two exceptions the losses fall upon wealthy men. All the property owners will rebuild immediately. The total loss is about \$300,000.
