Foulke on Woman Suffrage. "I have believed in woman suffrage for many years," said William Dudley

Foulke of Indiana, the prominent civil service reformer. "Certainly if suffrage be a right every argument which justifies it for men is equally strong for women. They have property to protect. They are subject to the laws and may be punished for breaking them in the same way that men are. Why, then, should they have no voice in making the laws? A representative government ought to represent every phase of thought which exists in the whole body of the people. It ought to reflect the opinions of women as well as of men. A government derives its just power from the consent of the governed, yet women are governed without

their consent." "Would any considerable number of women vote if they had the right?" "Yes, within a short time I think they would vote almost as generally as men do. As soon as the right of suffrage tion adopted at the meetings of the national is conferred it brings along duty with executive committee at Indianapolis and Chiit, and if it was conferred on women is conferred it brings along duty with they would feel that they ought to vote, and they will not fail to give their suffrages to those things which they believe will benefit their country.
