CARLISLE'S FINANCIAL SCHEME.

Explanation by the Secretary Before the House Banking Committee. Secretary of the Treasury Carlisle appeared before the house committee on banking and currency to explain the provisions of his currency scheme which was indorsed by the president in his message to congress. Controller Eckels also addressed the committee on the plan. He agreed with Carlisle as to method, but differed with him somewhat as to detail.

Secretary Carlisle took up each section of his recommendations: First, to repeal all laws requiring or authorizing a deposit of United States bonds as sesurity for circulation; second, to permit amount not exceeding 75 per cent of their paid up and unimpaired capital, ing the notes, to deposit a guaranty fund consisting of United States legal tender notes, including treasury notes of 1890, to the amount of 30 per cent or in part, its guaranty fund to be re- on the second ballot. turned to it in proportion to the amount of notes retired.

"The provision outlined," said Carlisle, "gives ample pro-tection without the deposit of bonds, as required by the present law." He added that the practical value of the reserve fund currency was shown in 1893. There was a demand for money aggregating \$40,000,000. The treasury did its best to meet the stringency, but by the time the notes were ready to distribute the demand had gone by and many of the packages of notes were returned unopened.

Representative Hall of Missouri suggested that there was a prevailing opinion that it was unsafe to place the power of the currency in the hands of corporations and banks.

"It will work automatically," said Carlisle. "This will not expand the currency unless the public needs it. Their interest will be to expand and contract as the common interests demand it. These interests will, therefore, control

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
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
