Dr. Whitman's Memory.

Chicago, March 11.—Dr. Marcus Whitman's mission was the theme yesterday of the sermon of a number of Congregational ministers. This is in accordance with a resolution, that on March 10 the sermons should be preached about the work of Dr. Whitman and that offerings should be taken to aid in providing a memorial of him. The memorial proposed is a \$200,000 endowment of Whitman's college at Walla Walla, which is near the site of Dr. Whitman's martyrdom. D. K. Pearson, of this city, has offered to give \$50,000 upon condition that an additional \$150,000 should be raised. Of this amount the city of Walla Walla already contributed \$50,000. The offerings made yesterday were liberal.

Oregon Farmers Alliance.

At a meeting of the state farmer's alliance, held in Ore on Cit: March 14 and 15, the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, John Eberhart, of Molalla; first vice-president, J. O. Ginn, of Linn county; second vice-president, George Ogilvie, of Molalla; secretary-treasurer, E. H. Hooper, of Carus; chairman John Bryant, of Jordan; lecturer, John Casco, of Clatsop county; steward, M. Davidson, of Columbia county; doorkeeper, George W. Weeks, of Marion; assistant-doorkeeper, J. B. Prickett, of Washington county; delegate to the national alliance, J. C. Luce, of Grant county; executive committee, S. H. Holt, E. C. Hamilton, J. D. Wilkeson.

The following resolutions were adopted: "We believe the time is ripe for co-operative effort, and as several co-operative stores have recently demonstrated their usefulness, we urge as a means of relief that our people generally patronize them. "We further recommend the establishment of co-operative plants and industries, such as creameries, canneries, tanneries, mills, stores, etc., and by co-operating to buy raw materials, to secure our trade and avoid needless middlemen's profits. We also recommend the study of various works on co-operation, especially those of Charles G. Darrow, 'The Principles and Triumphs of Labor,' by De Bernardi; 'Growth of Co-operative Communities,' by W. W. Channing; and 'The Principles of Co-operative Communities,' by W. W. Channing; and we ask the press of the state to publish these resolutions and place before the people articles on co-operation."

The United States consul at Luxembourg outlined the scheme of an international labor exchange, which has proven very beneficial in that grand duchy in facilitating the employment of labor. It was instituted in 1892 and every country operates in the same manner. The scheme is based on the principle of offering made and applications for employment between wage-payers and wage-earners. Offers and applications are sent to the nearest postmaster on special postal cards, and the applications are registered. The lists are publicly posted in all postoffices, in railway stations, hotels and public houses. The postmaster assumes no responsibility beyond the payment of the applications and posting of applications and offers. The postmaster is an offer of employment is received. A statement attached shows that during two years there were received through this system 1,904 applications for employment and 1,701 of these secured places. During the same time 3,514 employers applied for help and engaged 4,872 persons.

Joy's for the Jaded. Joy's Vegetable Sarsaparilla. CURIOUS FRENCH LAW. It is No Offense to Attempt to Commit a Crime When You Don't Succeed. A curious application of the old theory of impossible crime was made last week by the court of criminal appeals at Paris.

Two pickpockets named Fargant and Monty were arrested some weeks ago near a bureau d'omnibus in the exercise of their profession. Fargant watched, ready to receive the stolen goods, while his comrade explored the pockets of a man in the crowd. Luck did not wait for the thieves, however, for the victim's pockets were absolutely empty.

The Ninth chamber of the criminal courts condemned Monty to six months' imprisonment and Fargant to 13 months' imprisonment. They appealed and were both acquitted by virtue of the antique adage that there could be no theft where there was nothing to steal.

This is similar to a case which happened in Paris not long ago of a man who fired a load of bullets through a window at a bed where he believed an enemy was sleeping. The bedchamber was riddled with shot, but the bed was empty, the occupant fortunately having risen not long before. The court of appeals also decided in this instance that there was no case, as murder was manifestly impossible, and the would be assassin was acquitted. So, according to French law, it is not always true that the intention is equivalent to the act.

That any man can step into a florist's and order a bouquet for any lady is no longer possible in New York. There is a florist, and a very exclusive one, who refuses all orders that do not bear the "conventional" to be very polite about it. An elderly man unknown to the florist was refused a bouquet to be sent to a schoolgirl, and a young sport's greenback was handed back to him when he ordered a box of flowers for a beautiful society leader whom he had admired in her victoria.—New York Herald.

THE GREAT SHE.

Her Tribulation Say Her Age is Three Hundred Years.

Is it Mr. Rider Haggard's "Ebo" who has just fallen into the hands of the Boers? The Lydenburg correspondent of South Africa sends to that paper an interesting account of the capture of the "Queen Majestic, or Great She," who seems to have had a wonderful history.

"A peculiar fact is that her own tribe have never seen her. Only her Indians have allowed to see her. They number 12. The commander in chief is Jonas, an aged man. The rest are virtually young men. Only three women were ever allowed to see her. One is a bearded female, with beard fully two inches long from her chin. Around the sacred kral are wooden images, representing every nation of Kafir, and all sorts of animals beautifully carved out of wood."

"She" residence was an ordinary round hut, well built, and "when she also met she had to be carried by her Indians to another kral, and even then her name was not allowed to see her. "She had her great medicine tree in a forest, and all sorts of signs and symbols existed there, sacred to the Kafir mind, and in a kral near the tree were 140 fine tiger slaughter cases inclosed. The general had her carried by her trusted Indians to the head laager and allowed the Kholosone friendly natives to see this wonderful woman they had so often heard of. Her own tribe also gathered on her in some wonder."

The queen is of great age, fully 110, it is supposed, although her tribesmen say 300. "She is of a light copper color, with a frizzy sort of wool on her head and wears a sort of hood of tiger skin. Only her neck and face are bare. All her body is covered with royal tiger skins. The general would not allow the burghers to interfere with the wooden images, charms, etc. A missionary, the Rev. Mr. Raiter, who has lived 13 years near Majajie's and only seen her when captured, asked her why she had not allowed him to call on her. She politely replied, "That is my business."

LADY BROOKE'S CLOAK. The Fact That It Cost \$300 Has Stirred English Public Opinion. A healthy sign of the influence of public opinion on the wealthy classes was given lately. Some time ago the Countess of Warwick, better known perhaps as Lady Brooke, a dear friend of the Prince of Wales, lost, or there was stolen from her, a magnificent evening gown. The police description of the missing garment gave its value as \$300. Several domestic newspapers of no particular influence made unkind comments upon the extravagance of a woman who spends so much money for one article of dress. Some even went into statistics as to the number of poor people who could be fed a week for \$300. "Time was when any countess, or, for the matter of that, any woman, in this country would have gloried in the mere cost of her garments and would have been made happy by every newspaper recording it, but even aristocracy is sensitive to such matters now. The Countess of Warwick was quite shocked at the idea that anybody should suppose that she squandered \$300 upon herself and caused this paragraph to be inserted in the papers: "The cloak was a wedding present. I should have thought it wicked to have given so much for a single garment when there is so much distress and misery prevalent."

The letter of disclaimer does her ladyship credit, and it is only just to state that since her husband succeeded to the earldom she has set an example to her order by the way in which she has looked after the poorer tenants on the extensive estates in Essex and elsewhere. The Earl of Warwick, like most landowners, has been hit hard by the general agricultural depression, but the majority of territorial magnates made the reduction in their previous bloated incomes an excuse for neglecting the poor altogether.—London Letter.
