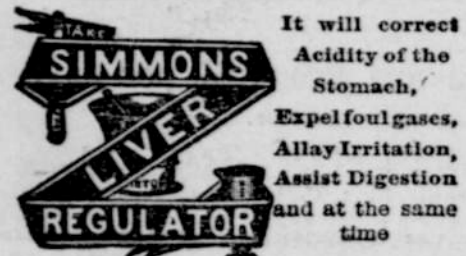

Death of Mrs. Hauser. Jacksonville, Or., March 22.—Mrs. Margaret Hauser, well-respected pioneer, was found dead at her residence Jacksonville about 9 o'clock this morning. She was 70 years of age. Her husband died in 1881. She was married to her first husband, Frank Krause, in Burlington, Iowa. A son was born there and the family came to Jacksonville in 1881. She has been an exemplary member of the Presbyterian church for many years. She was loved by all who knew her. She was 71 years old. Her funeral took place Sunday afternoon.

That Military Post. Portland Oregonian Editorial.] There is a local demand for the re-establishment of a military post in south-eastern Oregon. Fort Klamath, which was abandoned some months ago, is in the field as a candidate for this consideration, as is also Lakeview, the county seat of Lake county. Beyond the probability that a military post would open a limited market for certain supplies, there does not appear to be any reason for quarantining United States troops in that region. It is still in a sense a border land, to be sure, but the terrors of the border have disappeared, leaving only the question of a market for the fruits of their industry to vex the settlers. It is not clear that it is the duty of the government to bear a paternal hand in solving this problem; hence it is not likely that the demand for a military post in that section will be met by compliance at present.
