ON TRIAL FOR HIS LIFE. The Evidence in the Case of State vs. Frank Swingle For Killing Arthur Langell.

The Klamath Falls Express epitomizes the evidence at trial, in which jury disagreed, follows: Mrs. Orr—Knew deceased twelve years; under his employ at time of death; saw him last between 5 and 6 o'clock Sept. 7 riding a slow horse in direction where homicide occurred. Saw the deceased's body about daylight Sept. 8 in the Beekman enclosure. Did not see anything of the tragedy.

Mrs. Orr—Knew defendant; defendant told him within twenty-four hours after the homicide that he had killed Arthur Langell; also said day of homicide started out some cattle in another field which had gotten out of enclosure and was riding along fence when Mrs. Orr started peering down. He had full speed with an unfilled lather. Told Langell to stop, but he did not and instead said "I'll kill you," and rode closer whereupon she screamed. Saw the witness further stated was then in newspaper business and the statement was given to him by defendant for publication.
