In Kentucky the coal veins yield pure canal, semiantiarctic and bituminous coal. The Chattanooga district contains 36,000 square miles in three states, Tennessee, northern Alabama and Georgia. One mining plant near Birmingham turns out 600,000 tons of high grade coking coal in a year.

Within a stone's throw of the coal mine is the vein of iron ore, and in the mountainsides is the limestone to make the lime used in smelting and clearing the iron ore. Two hundred strikers at the United States plant works at Cleveland, O., went to the plant a few days ago armed with clubs and stones and expelled those at work. The strikers demand a 50 cent increase in wages of 50 cents a day. The works are guarded by police. Any attempt to put new men at work will be likely to cause serious trouble.

A young man named Gifford of Fruitvale, Alameda county, while working on the Stanislaus river at Copperopolis, was drowned. He and two others were working in a boat when it upset. The three men landed safely on a rock, but Gifford undertook to reach the shore by swimming and the current carried him down stream.

A report comes from the mountains of Montana, California, that the Victor Adams, a rancher, narrowly escaped lynching at the hands of his neighbors on account of cruelty to his 5-year-old daughter. He left her and a small dog to take care of a few sheep and the child let the animals wander off. Adams beat the dog to death and drove the child from the house, telling her if she came back without the sheep he would kill her. After several hours she came back begging for something to eat. He refused it and chased her away with a gun. She was gone all night and next evening was discovered 10 miles away.

At Bessemer, Ala., Bert Rockett, a former clerk, called at the wholesale liquor store of Albert Benson and demanded back salary which he said Benson owed him. A quarrel followed, resulting in Rockett drawing a big .45-caliber revolver and driving Benson from his own store. Benson told Rockett he would see him again. Later the men met on the most prominent street in town and renewed the quarrel, Rockett suggesting that they fight it out and asked Benson if he was armed. Benson said he was ready and both drew their pistols and began firing. They emptied their revolvers, after which Benson proposed to finish the fight with their fists. As Rockett stepped forward he fell dead, having been shot just below the heart. Benson, who was unharmed, was jailed.
